Albacore Tuna Make an Early Show in Oregon

Albacore tuna have made an early appearance in Oregon coastal waters according to the Fish Commission of Oregon's chartered research vessel Mitoi. Larry Hrehla, Fish Commission biologist in charge of albacore investigations, reported a catch of 13 albacore 120 miles west of Cape Lookout on July 3, 8 in the same position further north on July 4 and 8 fish on July 5 only 70 to 120 miles west of Tillamook Head. A research vessel operated by the American Fishermen's Research Foundation hooked 40 albacore before noon on July 5, 150 miles west of Cape Blanco, adding confirmation of the presence of substantial schools of albacore off Oregon's coast.

Timing and number of albacore migrating through coastal waters appear to be related to ocean conditions particularly water temperature. Warm water currents result in fluctuating catches in adjacent areas and accurate predictions are impossible with these small test fishing observations. In the past ten years, annual landings have varied from a low of 3.2 million pounds in 1961 to a high of 37.7 million pounds in 1968. The yearly tuna research cruises, conducted by the Fish Commission since 1959, locate schools of albacore for Oregon fishermen as well as obtain research data on water temperature and weather as they pertain to albacore migration. Tuna passing along Oregon's coast move in a drift of warm water from 30 to 100 miles offshore. This year's early test catches were made in water temperatures of 62 degrees in a drift which extended to depths of 80 to 90 feet. Water conditions seemed ideal for albacore.

Information obtained from the Mitoi is relayed by the Fish Commission's research laboratory in Astoria to the National Marine Fisheries Service in LaJolla, California. An NMFS computer summarizes these data along with information obtained from other sources and the entire Pacific tuna fleet as an aid in locating these elusive and unpredictable fish.

Registration Will Begin for Fall Term

Portland Community College will begin registration for fall term classes August 14, a month earlier than in previous years. The new procedures allow for 200 registrations daily and will enable students to make use of PCC's counseling and advising services. Registrar Allen Widstrom says, "Students will be able to take the time to thoroughly plan their schedules with the help of our counselors. They won't be rushed by lines of people."

The following is a schedule of registration times for fall term. Returning students who have pre-registered and have received an appointment will register August 14-25. If a student cannot make his appointment time he may register any Wednesday evening after the appointment time between August 16 and September 13, 5 p.m. to 8 p.m.

Students new to PCC who pre-registered spring term will register August 28 to September 15, or any Wednesday evening after the appointment time. New students who preregistered summer term will be given appointment times between September 19 and September 21.

Open registration will be September 22, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., September 23-28, 9 a.m. to 8 p.m., and September 29, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. There will be no registration September 18.

At the Sylvania center, 12000 S. W. 49th Avenue, students will register in the College Center Mall. At the Cascade center, 705 N. Killingsworth, students will register in the Cascade auditorium.

QUESTION: When my wife died, I got a lump-sum payment from social security. Must this money be used for burial expenses only?
ANSWER: No. You can use the check for any purpose. The payment is made to the person who paid the burial expenses only if there is no surviving husband or wife. Then, the check would go to the person paying the burial expenses, or it can be authorized to the funeral director.

Beef Prices Not Likely to Drop

Unless meat imports increase significantly, lifting of meat import quotas isn't likely to cause much change in either farm or retail price of meat in the U.S., says an Oregon State University agricultural economist.

And, adds S.C. Marks, OSU extension agricultural economist, there is no prospect meat imports will increase very much in the near future, because it takes foreign suppliers time to step up production and to move meat to the United States market.

Even more important, Marks notes, is the fact there is currently a general world shortage of beef, with foreign suppliers committed to supply meat to established and expanded markets in other nations as well as the U.S.

World demand for beef continues to expand with population increases and rising personal incomes, particularly in the industrialized nations. Although beef production is increasing, it is not increasing fast enough to match current demands, Marks points out, partly because producers around the world are holding back animals for herd expansion.

The steady rise in cattle prices in step with the high rate of inflation in recent years and international monetary policies provide incentive for herd building, he adds. Even if beef imports should increase with the suspension of import quotas, the increase will not be in the quality beef Americans prefer, the economist notes. Most imported beef is of the manufacturing grade used in making hamburger, sausages, luncheon meat, and canned meat preparations, such as baby foods.

Imports that compete directly with the choice steaks and roasts, produced in American feedlots and preferred by consumers are very small, he points out.

Principal suppliers of foreign beef, most of which comes to the U.S. in boneless frozen form are Australia and New Zealand. Other substantial suppliers are Mexico, Ireland, Canada and Brazil.
