DEQ Slates Two Pollution Meets

Fail-safe pollution controls will be stressed at Department of Environmental Quality meetings for cities and industries September 28 and 29.

The day-long informational seminars will acquaint participants with procedures for Oregon's new Joint State-Federal Waste Discharge Permits. Federal staff are now housed in DEQ offices where they will work directly with DEQ on issuing of the new permits.

The recent pump station failure at Salem which dumped millions of gallons of untreated sewage into the Willamette River in August will be reviewed with an eye to possibilities for fail-safe equipment and emergency plans which could head off similar crises in the future. DEQ expects to consider these factors in future plans reviews of pollution control equipment.

The two meetings will be identical except for late afternoon sessions on construction grants in the September 28 seminar for cities and consultants, while industries will discuss tax credits September 29.

Both meetings will be at the new Civic Center in Salem.
