Vernonia Police Release Report

The Vernonia Police Department's report of activities, as read into record at Monday's council session by Police Commissioner Lucille Tomlin, gave the following data for the month of August.

Traffic citations, 4; juvenile referrals, 7 complaints, 11 juveniles involved; family disputes, 6; dog complaints, 9; misdemeanors, 5; traffic warnings, 9; prowler calls 3; and miscellaneous calls, 12.

Investigations: health hazards, 2; assistance was given to the public on 19 occasions, on six ambulance calls; and traffic control was provided on two fire calls.

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Lincoln Starts 63 Townhouses

Construction will begin soon on "Central Park", a 63 townhouse condominium development near the heart of Beaverton, according to Donald W. Hirschberger, president of Lincoln Company, a subsidiary of Lincoln Savings and Loan Association.

The project is located near Beaverton High School between S.W. Main Street and Erickson Avenue and S.W. 5th and 9th. "Central Park" is a truly "people oriented" residential area and retains the green-belt beauty of the natural creek which bisects the area.

Phase One of the 1.6 million dollar project will contain 17 units. These will feature models of the various townhouses. Five different two and three bedroom floor plans are available ranging in price from \$24,000 to \$30,000. Pre-sales are already underway.

Every townhouse will be fully equipped with range, dishwasher and garbage disposal. Most have garages and carports, plus a bulk storage area. Secluded private patios are an important element in every townhouse.

Among the amenities cited for the new development are special play yard areas, a community recreation building and day care center and swimming pool.

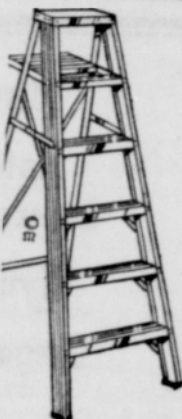
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
