

Bureau Honors Buxton Woman

Since 1943 Mrs. Ella L. Albrecht of Buxton, has been a cooperative rainfall observer for the National Weather Service. September 12, it was announced by the Commerce Department's National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) that Mrs. Albrecht is one of 24 volunteer weather observers selected nationwide to receive the John Campanius Holm Award.

John Campanius Holm Awards were created in 1959 by the National Weather Service and are presented annually to honor volunteer observers for outstanding accomplishments in the field of meteorological observations. The award is named for a Lutheran minister who is the first person known to have taken systematic weather observations in the American colonies. In 1644 and 1645, the Reverend Holm made records of the climate, without the use of instruments, near the present site of Wilmington, Delaware.

Mrs. Albrecht was recognized for her outstanding and dedicated service in providing precipitation observations and reports that have benefited her community and the state of Oregon. Mrs. Albrecht's reports have been a great asset to the National Weather Service's hydrological and climatological programs in the area.

When severe storms strike, Mrs. Albrecht obtains forecasts from the Weather Service's River District Office and disseminates them to the community. She also provides daily precipitation summaries to the nearby Hillsboro and Forest Grove newspapers.

In 1968, Mrs. Albrecht received the Weather Service's 25-year Length of Service Award. She is active in Buxton's community activities and has varied interests, including gardening, bird watching, hunting, and fishing.

The National Weather Service has 13,000 volunteer observers throughout the United States who make and record daily weather observations. The information they gather is processed and published by the Environmental Data Service, another major component of NOAA, and forms a valuable part of the nation's weather history.

Oregon Host for State Foresters Annual Meeting

Oregon will host a 3½ day conference of the National Association of State Foresters later this month for the first time in the organization's 52 year history. State Foresters or their equivalents from all 50 states are expected to attend.

The NASF is primarily concerned with developments on a national plane which will affect forestry at the state level. The group meets annually and standing committees conduct the organization's business throughout the rest of the year. The group is very active in lobbying for forestry legislation which will benefit the states.

Kessler Cannon, the Governor's Assistant for Natural Resources, will deliver the keynote address on the morning of September 25 when the conference kicks off at the Sheraton Hotel in Portland. Cannon is speaking for Governor Tom McCall who is recovering from an illness. Senator Mark O. Hatfield will address the group at a luncheon meeting on the same day.

A full schedule of activities is planned to augment the meeting both for the foresters and for their wives. Included on the schedule are a forest management tour to review logging operations and forest practices in Clatsop County, and a scenic bus tour to take in the Columbia River Gorge and Mt. Hood. An evening tour of the Western Forestry Center is also scheduled.

Reports from the standing committees will occupy a major part of the meeting. The committees are the hands and arms of the organization and cover a variety of subjects including legislation, forest fire prevention, radio communication, cooperative forest management, cooperative pest control, forest recreation, water resources, fire danger rating systems and others.

Oregon State Forester J.E. Schroeder will step down from the executive committee having served for the past year as immediate past president. He has also served as a vice-chairman on the Legislative Committee and as a member of the Forest Fire and Radio Committees.

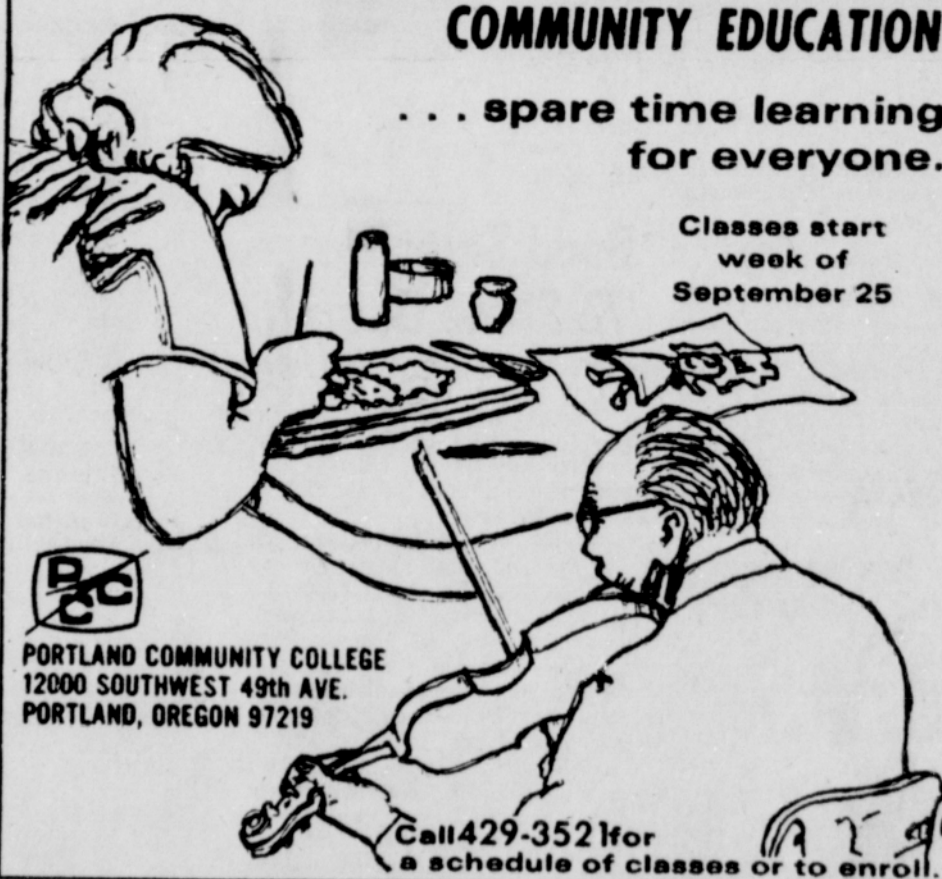

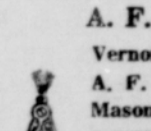
