Handicapped Students Get More Consideration at PCC

Portland Community College has opened its doors a little wider this year to enable more and more physically handicapped students to take advantage of the college's educational opportunities.

In the past year PCC has developed special services to make it easier for students with physical disabilities to attend college, set career goals, and follow individual programs designed to help them achieve their goals.

As President Amo De Bernardis says, "We believe that developing services for handicapped students is part of the college's commitment to provide educational opportunities to all people of the district."

Architectural barriers, often a major deterrent to a physically handicapped person, have been minimized at PCC. The Sylvania center at 12000 S.W. 49th Avenue has been designed with ramps and or elevators which provide convenient access to all class rooms and activity areas. A parking lot adjacent to the new Health Technology building allows students in wheelchairs to enter and leave the building easily. Restrooms at PCC are equipped with extra wide stalls, handbars, lowered mirrors and towel racks, and sinks with fixtures which may be turned on by just tapping them.

New physical education facilities include special equipment for students in wheelchairs. The college also provides an extra wheelchair in each shower area so that students who use wheelchairs may take showers. A physical therapist

works with the physical education instructors in planning activities for any physical need.

Portland Community College provides transportation for physically handicapped persons from their homes to any of the college centers and back again. The transportation project is partially funded by the Oregon State Board of Education under their Vocational Amendment Act of 1968.

Students and handicapped people interested in visiting the college ride in a specially-designed van equipped with an electric lift, tracks, and seat belts. The drivers, Virginia Ruggles and Betty Moore, operate the van from 6:45 in the morning until 6 in the evening.

Career counseling to allow choice of a vocation which suits the individual interests and capabilities of the handicapped student is also available. Classes taught by counselor Jeanette Emigh stress personal inventory and evaluation. Students learn about pre-employment situations, communication, and on-the-job experiences.

PCC is currently offering the following classes for deaf students: typing, basic recordkeeping, writing, consumer economics, Psychology of Human Relations, basic math, and elementary algebra.

Nicolai Mountain Timber Sale Tops \$1 Million Mark

A single timber sale offered recently by the Astoria District of the State Forestry Department drew bids exceeding \$1 million, the most offered for a state timber sale since 1968.

The Greasy Spoon No. 1 sale in a remote area southeast of Nicolai Mountain in Clatsop County was sold to the Rainier Manufacturing Company for \$1,040,000 after spirited oral bidding. There were eight qualified bidders, but only three offered bids after competition immediately began spiraling the price.

The sale consists of two units totaling 200 acres and containing 9,630,000 board feet of fir, and lesser volumes of hemlock, cedar, other conifers and hardwoods. The total appraised value of the sale was \$590,000.

Bidding was for the Douglas fir with prices already established on the minor species. The fir, 90 to 100 years old, was appraised at \$60.35 per thousand board feet, and was bid up to \$107 per thousand board feet.

The bid price also includes the cost of building and rebuilding some 22 miles of road at an estimated cost of \$274,000.

Assistant District Forester

George Schoppert in Astoria says the sale was some four years in the planning and is considerably larger than usual in order to pay for the extensive road construction.

The sale buyer is allowed a reduction of \$39.20 per thousand board feet on the first seven million board feet logged to amortize the road construction cost.

The mainline road will connect highway 202 in the Northrup Creek area with highway 30 near Bradley Park. It was designed not just to haul timber for this sale, but also because it will open up a larger area for the utilization of alder pulpwood, a growing industry in northwestern Oregon.

The road has been designed and engineered with environmental protection in mind in compliance with the Forest Practices Act, Schoppert says, and buffer strips have been planned to protect the upper headwaters of Fishhawk Creek which are in the sale area.

General Plans Construction For 1973 Year

General Telephone Company of the Northwest will spend approximately \$52,000,000 for company operations and construction of new facilities for Oregon during 1973, according to J.E. Sherar, new vice president-general manager-Oregon.

Approximately \$30,000,000 of that will be operating expenses covering wages, employee benefits, state and local taxes as well as rents and materials.

About \$22,100,000 has been allocated for new construction and equipment additions to expand and upgrade service throughout the state.

Such expenditures are necessary, according to Sherar, to deal with the tremendous growth of the areas where General Telephone operates. "The number of telephones in the state of Oregon has increased by 20 percent in the past two and a half years. And by the end of 1973, General Telephone will be serving about 197,000 telephones, almost a ten percent increase over 1972," he added.

"We expect this growth to continue. Our estimates project that by 1975, we will be serving close to 233,000 telephones."

Company investment during 1973 will be directed not only to meeting this growth, but to reducing the number of customers on suburban lines, placing rural construction underground and adding to customer contact facilities.

By 1975, General Telephone is expected to invest an additional \$100,000,000 in construction and equipment, nearly doubling the present investment in Oregon.
