



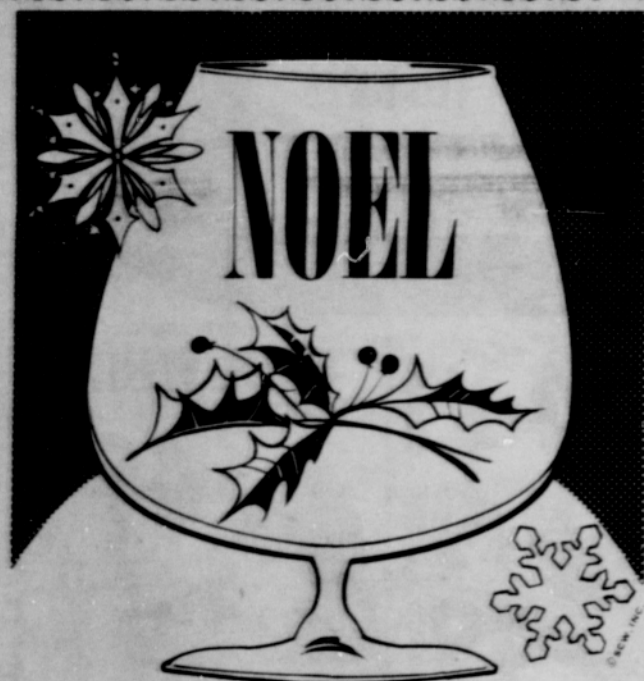

Sales Require ODA Inspection

Living Christmas trees are becoming increasingly popular.

And it is possible, says the Oregon Department of Agriculture, that as a result of this popularity some Christmas tree growers have inadvertently fallen into the classification of nurserymen.

As nurserymen these growers, the department points out, are subject to requirements of the Oregon Nursery Law, which includes licensing by the Oregon Department of Agriculture and inspection prior to the trees being dug.

The nursery stock inspections are for detecting the presence of plant pests, diseases and noxious weeds. Listed as noxious weeds not acceptable in nursery stock are quack grass, Canadian thistle, morning glory, norsetail rush.

Any nursery stock, and this includes balled living Christmas trees, found to be infested with noxious weeds cannot be sold as nursery stock.

Application for nursery licenses in Oregon are made on a form furnished by the department of agriculture. The license fee is based on a one mill per dollar of business basis, with a minimum fee of \$25 to cover the first \$25,000 worth of sales.

Persons not licensed as nurserymen and planning to sell the living Christmas trees can call the Salem office of the Oregon Department of Agriculture at 378-3776 or the Portland branch office at 229-6049 for additional information.

Unit Added at The Dalles Dam

An additional 100,000 kilowatts of electrical power were added to the capability of the Columbia River System the past week when Unit 15, the first of eight new units being added at The Dalles Dam, began producing power on Monday.

Lieutenant Colonel Neil Saling, Portland U.S. Army Deputy District Engineer, announced that Unit 16 is expected to be on the line later this week to add another 100,000 kilowatts of available electrical power to the Northwest system. The additional 200,000 kilowatts is equal to two-thirds of the amount of power which was curtailed for industrial use during the period of high demand the past week, Colonel Saling said.

Addition of the new units at The Dalles Dam was begun in March of 1970 under a \$16 million contract with Halvorsen-Mason Construction Company. The remaining six additional units, now under various stages of construction, are expected to begin producing power by mid-1973, to complete the total of 22 powerhouse units provided for in the original construction of The Dalles Dam Colonel Saling said.

Film, Graphics Course at PSU

"Film and Graphic Art" is a new course set for Wednesday evenings during winter term at Portland State University.

The course will be offered on a regular three credit hour as well as on a non-credit basis for community people. Fee for non-credit attendance is \$25.

The course will explore the elements that static images share with moving images to try to determine which images can be fruitfully transmuted into film, and which are irrelevant or a hindrance to communication by moving image," according to Andres Deinum, professor of film and director of PSU's Center for the Moving Image.

Deinum will co-teach the course with Anne Johnson of PSU's art department. Class will begin January 3 at 7:15 p.m. in 75 Lincoln Hall.

Registration for both credit (AL 407-91) and non-credit (AL T60-101) will be at the CMI table in the PSU gymnasium January 3. Persons unable to register at that time should contact Mrs. Margie Merriweather in 491 Neuberger Hall.

Course subjects will include: silent films as pure graphic art; Baroque painting and movies; Dutch genre painting and documentary film; Eisenstein's preoccupation with visual art; the paintings of Pierre Auguste Renoir and the films of his son Jean; surrealism, expressionism and modernism in painting and film; the functions of color; and successful syntheses of graphic art and film.

Workers Should Check Records of Earnings

Norman O. Nilsen, the State Labor Commissioner, has issued a reminder to working Oregonians that they keep accurate records of all work performed in order to insure that they receive the correct amount of pay.

The records should include where the work was performed, the type of work performed, the number of hours of work and the rate of pay. Nilsen said such records are admissible as evidence if a dispute should arise.

The Labor Commissioner said that persons who have questions about wage problems should contact the Wage and Hour Division of the Oregon Bureau of Labor at the bureau's offices in Portland, Eugene, Pendleton, Salem and Medford.

Oregon Drivers Lose Licenses

Nearly 1,700 Oregon drivers have had their licenses to drive suspended for 90 days this year because they have refused to take a chemical test to determine how much alcohol was in their blood.

Under the state's implied consent law, refusal to take a test after arrested for a driving while intoxicated charge is grounds for a 90-day license suspension. This suspension has no relationship to the subsequent outcome of the drinking charge.

Suspensions for refusal to take the tests have increased this year by 59 percent, according to the Motor Vehicles Division, and reflect the stepped-up enforcement programs against drinking drivers in the state. Through November, 10,015 driving under the influence convictions had been reported—a 32 percent increase over 1971.

Under the implied consent law, police agencies report to the Motor Vehicles Division when a driver under arrest for driving under the influence refuses to take a chemical test.

As a footnote, the agency has received 324,609 abstracts of traffic violation convictions through November. The figure represents a seven percent increase over the comparable period in 1971.
