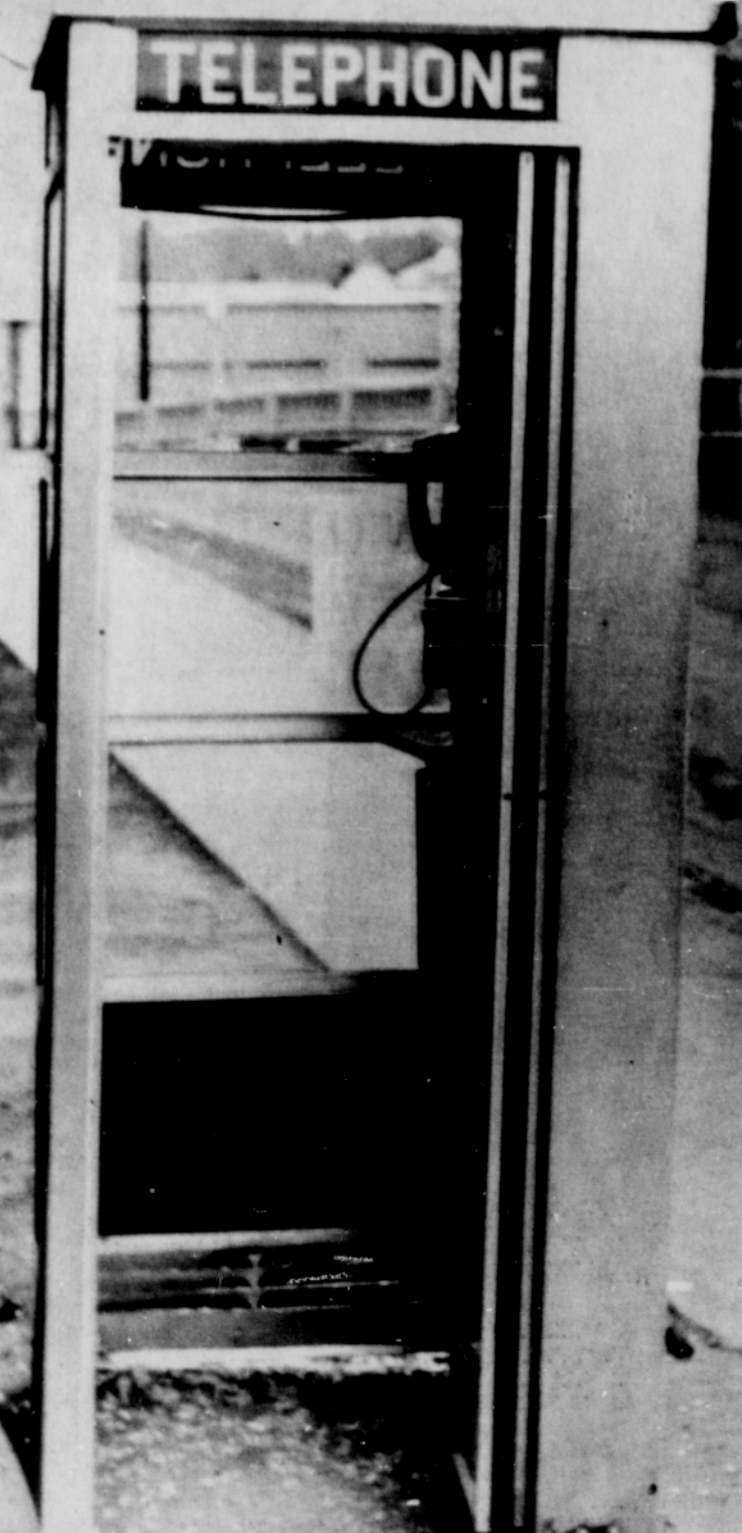

Illness Claims Area Resident

Jessie M. Raymond, 84-year-old widow of the late Gar Raymond, died at her home at 3015 Pacific Avenue, Forest Grove January 19 following an extended illness.

Funeral services were held at the Fuiten Mortuary Chapel, Forest Grove Wednesday, January 24, at 1 p.m.

The Rev. Richard Perry, pastor of the First Christian Church of Forest Grove, officiated at the services, with Rich Osburn, soloist. Grange ritualistic services were under the auspices of the Washington County Pomona Grange. Committal rites were at the family plot at the Forest View Cemetery, Forest Grove.

Born October 9, 1888 at Deadwood, South Dakota, Mrs. Raymond was the daughter of the late Joseph and Ida Sims Perkins. When she was four years of age she came with her family to Spokane. She later lived at Tacoma and was united in marriage to Gar Raymond at Everett, Washington on October 9, 1906.

After their marriage they moved to Forest Grove and lived here nine years, moving thence to the Nehalem Valley near Jewell. They lived in the Nehalem Valley for 40 years and then moved back to Forest Grove where Mrs. Raymond had lived the last 15 years.

Mrs. Raymond in her earlier years here had been a member of the First Christian Church of Forest Grove. She had also been a member of the Grange for over 45 years, and was a member of the Sunset Grange at Manning.

She was preceded in death by her husband in 1958. The last member of her immediate family, a sister, Mrs. Sadie Plinkivich died here in July 1972. Surviving is a nephew, Herbert Marsh of Portland and several great nieces and great nephews.

Atkins Service Read Saturday

Marie Atkins, 72-year-old resident of the Vernonia area for the past half century died at her home on Mist Route, Vernonia, January 17, following a brief serious illness.

Funeral services for Mrs. Atkins were held at the Fuiten Mortuary Chapel, Vernonia, Saturday, January 20, at 1 p.m.

The Rev. Jack Carlson, pastor of the Vernonia Evangelical Church, conducted the service with Mrs. Frank Serafin as soloist, and Mrs. Lloyd Thomas, organist. Concluding services and interment were at the Vernonia Memorial Cemetery with Tom Hall, Bill Horn, Sam Hearing, Glen Hawkins, Harry Culbertson and Harry Emmons serving as pallbearers.

Mrs. Atkins was born at Amity, Oregon on July 15, 1900, the daughter of the late Augustus and Sarah Baker Simmons, who were early residents in that area. She received her education at Amity and was united in marriage to Earl L. Atkins at Vancouver, Washington on June 26, 1919. Since 1920 they had lived in Columbia and Clatsop counties, living in various communities where her husband worked in the logging and lumbering industry. They lived a number of years in the Birkenfeld area before moving to her present home near Vernonia.

Mrs. Atkins was very active in community and fraternal work and was a member of the Vernonia Evangelical Church, N. Heart Rebekah Lodge No. 243, Vernonia Temple No. 61, Pythian Sisters, the American Legion Auxiliary and the Veterans of World War I Auxiliary. Her hobby was cooking and helping other people, and a few years ago she was named the first "Woman of the Year" by the Vernonia Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Atkins preceded her in death here in October, 1958.

Surviving is a daughter, Mrs. June Ray, and a son, L.E. "Bud" Atkins, both of Vernonia; two sisters, Mrs. Mildred Andes of Portland, and Mrs. Leta Cooley of Port Orford; eight grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren.

John Heltzel Rites Tuesday

John Heltzel, 77, who was a native of the Banks community and a life-long resident of this area, died January 19 at his home in Vernonia, following a brief illness.

Funeral services for Mr. Heltzel were held Tuesday, January 23, at 11 a.m. at the Fuiten Mortuary Chapel, Vernonia.

The Rev. Father Anthony Gussin of St. Mary's Catholic Church in Vernonia conducted the services, with Mrs. Lloyd Thomas serving as organist. Concluding rites and interment were at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday at the Willamette National Cemetery in Portland.

Mr. Heltzel was born April 12, 1895 at Banks, the son of the late William and Elizabeth Heery Heltzel, who were early residents and farmers in the Manning area. He received his education at Banks and then helped farm the families farm for a number of years.

He later moved to Portland and worked for the City of Portland at the city jail for 14 years before he retired. After retiring there, he moved to Vernonia where he made his home for the past twelve years. During his years at Vernonia he had been custodian at the post office.

Mr. Heltzel was a veteran of World War I and served with the U.S. Army's 91st Division. He was with the AEF in France and participated in the St. Mihiel, Meuse Argonne and Yperes-Lys campaigns. He was a member of the American Legion and of the 91st Division Association.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Nellie Mann Heltzel of Vernonia, to whom he was married at Stevenson, Washington April 1, 1960. Also surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Walter (Betty) Black and Mrs. Leo (Norma) Dernbach, both of Portland; two sisters, Mrs. Mary Woodyard and Mrs. Kathryn Marks, both of Portland; and three grandchildren.
