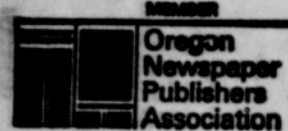

Dinner Honors Retiree Polos

Anthony J. Polos of Aloha retired
in January as Hydrologist in
Charge, Portland River Forecast
Center of the National Weather
Service. He has worked 37 years in
federal service, and was the first
Hydrologist in Charge at the Port-
land River Forecast Center, coming
from Atlanta, Georgia to Portland
in 1950 when this Columbia River
Basin Forecast Center was formed.

Prior to heading the Atlanta
River Center, Tony was Hydrologist
in Charge of the River Center in San
Francisco, and Fort Worth, Texas,
and with the Soil Conservation
Service in Texas and Ohio.

Polos has served as the U.S.
Department of Commerce (alter-
nate) member of the Pacific North-
west River Basin's Commission.
For the past 15 years he has been a
member of the Columbia River
Water-Management Group, and nu-
merous subcommittees dealing
with plans and problems in the field
of hydraulics, hydrology, and com-
prehensive river basin planning.

River forecasts are used in many
ways and the River Forecast Center
works closely with the U.S. Corps of
Engineers, Bonneville Power Ad-
ministration, state engineers and
private industry.

Polos was honored with a dinner
party at the Inn at the Quay in
Vancouver, Washington January
17, attended by 75 of his friends and
associates from the Portland area
as well as from Seattle, Boise, Salt
Lake City, and San Francisco.

The Polos family has lived in
Aloha for 23 years but will move to
the Vernonia area later this year.
They are looking forward to making
their home here and making new
friends as well as keeping their ties
with all their friends in the Portland
- Hillsboro area.

Wednesday morning, January 31.
Funeral arrangements are pend-
ing at Fuiten Mortuary Chapel.

Currie Service Read Saturday

Grace Currie, 87-year-old resi-
dent of the Vernonia area for almost
50 years, died January 23 at a
Portland care center, following an
illness of the past several months.

Mrs. Currie was a native and life-
long resident of Oregon, the daugh-
ter of a pioneer Douglas County
couple, Clarence and Jane Sherrett
Ricker. She was born October 15,
1885, in the Smith River area of
Douglas County. She spent all of her
early life and received her educa-
tion there, and was first married to
Evermont Blevens Miner in 1904.

They lived in Cottage Grove and
Portland before moving to Vernonia
in the early 1920's.

Mrs. Currie had lived in Vernonia
continuously since first coming
here and was later united in mar-
riage to James Currie of Vernonia.
He preceded her in death here 20
years ago.

Mrs. Currie was a longtime active
member of the Vernonia Christian
Church. She was also a member of
Nehalem Chapter No. 153, Order of
Eastern Star, and of Mt. Heart
Rebekah Lodge No. 243. She had
been a member of the Rebekah
Lodge for the past 69 years and was
believed to hold the longest contin-
uous membership in the state.

She is survived by a daughter,
Mrs. Ramona Quendens of Portland;
a step-son, Jim Currie, Sacra-
mento, California; and a sister,
Mrs. Carl (Bernice) Wipper, of
Turner, Oregon. A son, Sherman,
preceded her in death.

Funeral services for Mrs. Currie
were held at the Fuiten Mortuary
Chapel, Vernonia, Saturday, Janu-
ary 27, with the Rev. Russell Vin-
yard, pastor of the Vernonia Chris-
tian Church, officiating. Mrs. Lloyd
Thomas was organist, and Mrs.
William Kretschmer served as
soloist.

Concluding rites and interment
were at the Vernonia Memorial
Cemetery with Walt Linn, Glen
Hawkins, Cliff Norwood, Warren
Aldrich, Sam Hearing, and Merle
Cline serving as pallbearers.

Veteran Loans Show Increase

The Department of Veterans' Af-
fairs granted 7,927 loans last year in
the amount of \$144,480,202, H.C.
Saalfeld, director, has reported.
This was a new record for dollar
volume, exceeding the previous
record set in 1971 by more than \$5
million.

In Columbia County last year,
loans were granted to 154 veterans
in the amount of \$2,705,601 com-
pared with 126 loans in 1971 for
\$2,219,300.

Veterans have repaid \$573 million
in principal on their loans and \$204
million in interest, with monthly re-
payments averaging over \$9 mil-
lion. Of the 95,289 loans granted,
54,424 were outstanding December
31 in the amount of \$748,908,361.

Only 30 percent of the eligible
veterans have used the loan, leav-
ing 185,000 who are still entitled.

icapped. The blind, deaf, retarded

put under one general classifica-
tion, "those individuals having
learning difficulties," rather than
being grouped by individual dis-
abilities.

lory chairman of the special com-
mittee for the Work Activity Center.
Mrs. Thorp, Mrs. Jack Mangas, and
Mrs. Ray Kammer will be serving
with her.

Mrs. John Wiley, director of the
Activity Center, stated that the cen-
ter has recently received a gen-
erous donation from Multnomah
Plywood Corp., who matched the
total of employee UGN donations.
Crafts, basic number skills, al-

phabet, and safety signs are being
stressed daily at the center. This
month's project is the decoration of
the display windows in Grandma's
Trunk Store. The Friday morning
bowling session is enthusiastically
received and looked forward to by
center participants.

First Day of Issue Ceremony Tied in with Coliseum Show

A First Day of Issue ceremony
February 16, at 12:30 p.m. in the
Weyerhaeuser Room of the Port-
land Memorial Coliseum, Portland,
for the new 8-cent Pamphleter
commemorating honoring the Am-
erican Revolution Bicentennial will
be open to the public.

Designed by William A. Smith of
Pineville, Pennsylvania, the com-
memorative-size horizontal stamp
will be issued in conjunction with
the International Northwest Post-
age Stamp Exposition (INPEX).
The stamp shows a group of five
patriots. One is a printer pulling the
bar of a hand press. The others are
commenting on the pamphlet being
printed.

This stamp, one of a set of four to
be issued in 1973 that signals The
Rise of the Spirit of Independence,
points to the roles of the printer and
pamphleter in uniting patriots and
in keeping their courage high. It
will be printed by the Bureau of
Engraving and Printing on the
Glori press and distributed in
panes of 50.

Among many exhibits at INPEX
'73 will be demonstrations of print-
ing from engraved plates by the
Treasury Department, Bureau of
Engraving and Printing, Post Of-
fices having exhibits and sales
booths include Canada, United Na-
tions, Papua New Guinea, Crown
Agents for the British Post Office,
and the United States Postal Ser-
vice "INPEX Station" which will
process mail with a specially de-
signed INPEX cancellation.

Member dealers of American
Stamp Dealers' Association from
Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Mon-
tana and British Columbia will have
booths in the bourse.
