Board of Commissioners

(Unapproved Minutes)

The Columbia County Board of Commissioners met in scheduled session February 14 with Chairman Fred Foshaug presiding. Commissioners Minkoff and Ahlborn, and secretary Gloria Salvey (deputy clerk) present.

George Mann, deputy roadmaster, met with the board and presented Purchase Order No. 1679 for 40 cutting edges (grader blades) for a total amount of \$1,407.24. Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded the purchase order be approved. Motion carried.

The board discussed with Mann the advisability of sending some of the road department employees to a weed spray school to become eligible to become licensed. It was concluded two men would be sent.

An order and deed were signed in favor of William Filter, conveying Tax Lot 444-84, being tract in Vernonia.

Request for Cancellation of Taxes No. 233 was signed in favor of Art and Veda Johnston, in the sum of \$34.66.

Orders reimbursing taxes were signed as follows: Art and Veda Johnston, \$34.66, reduction by Tax Court; Elsie Thompson, \$236.37, duplicate payment; Department of Vets for Mastercraft Homes, \$13.51, wrong account number; Mel Harper, for Warren Heights Sub., \$69, duplicate payment.

Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded Robert Howard be appointed a member of the Fair Board for a three-year term, effective January 1, 1973. Motion carried.

After discussion of the Emergency Employment Act and the county's participation, Gloria Salvey was designated to replace Robert Vance to work with the employment division, and Gerilyn Johnson was requested to continue preparation of the monthly reports required.

Clerk Roy Nelson and Gerilyn Johnson, chief accountant, met with the board to discuss the vacancy in the EEA accounting-data processing clerk position. After discussion, it was concluded to fill the vacancy if possible, and if the person had sufficient time, he would also be assigned as relief in various other departments as needed.

Robert M. Brown and John DeFrance met with the board to present an agreement for signature for finishing of a room in the sheriff's department to be used for closed circuit TV. Said agreement was signed by the board.

John DeFrance advised that a check in the sum of \$8,220 had been received from the Oregon Traffic Safety Council for enforcement of DUI.

Frank LeMont, assessor, and Martin Sells, county counsel, met with the board to discuss the application submitted by Beaver Sports Properties for Open Space Land Assessment. A public hearing will be held as required under ORS 306.745 to 306.790.

Liquor license application was approved for the Deer Island Market.

Lindsay Rites Conducted Here

A funeral service was held for Robert Samuel Lindsay at the Vernonia Christian Church Feb. 6.

Robert Lindsay was born in Des Moines, Iowa June 6, 1882, and came to the Nehalem Valley in 1901. He married Alice Peterson June 28, 1911.

Mr. Lindsay was active in Neighbors of Woodcraft and Woodmen of the World, and was a 65-year member of the Grange. He was also active in the Columbia County Historical Society and devoted much time to the establishment of the historical museum. He and his wife did much of the remodeling of the museum building.

Robert Lindsay was a Christian and served as an elder in the Christian Church of Vernonia.

He passed away Feb. 3, 1973 in Redmond, and is survived by his son, Clarence Lindsay; grandsons, Rob Lindsay, Terry Lindsay, Dan Lindsay and Bill Frenzel; a granddaughter, Lani Schroeder; and sisters, Estelle Pye and Gertie Redmond; and a brother, Charles Lindsay.

Scofield Area Resident Dies

Funeral services for Frances M. Riddle, 65-year-old native and lifelong resident of the Scofield and Buxton area, were held Saturday, February 17, at the Fuiten Mortuary Chapel in Forest Grove.

The Rev. Bob Hyaes, pastor of the United Methodist Church of Banks, conducted the services, with Gary Widrig serving as soloist. Concluding rites and burial were at the Buxton Cemetery with Everett Drury, Bill Crowther, John Fellas, Lloyd Fast, Monte Tallman and Oral Varley serving as pallbearers.

Mrs. Riddle was born May 1, 1907 at the family home at Scofield near Buxton, the daughter of the late Andrew and Lovell Day Sanders. She received her education there and lived her entire lifetime in the Buxton area.

She worked a number of years as the assistant postmaster at Buxton and also worked in the Buxton Mercantile Store during these years.

Her husband, the late Claude Riddle to whom she was married at Vancouver, Washington on July 1, 1941, preceded her in death in October, 1971. Mrs. Riddle died very unexpectedly February 13 at the Tuality Community Hospital after being hospitalized and ill for only four days. Her death was attributed to a heart condition.

Surviving are three sons, Chester Canby of Willamina, Trevor Canby of Manning and Melvin Canby of Banks; a daughter, Mrs. Frank (Naomi) Perry, San Francisco; a step-son, Cecil Riddle, Albany, Oregon; a step-sister, Mrs. George (Amanda) Warren, Toledo, Washington; fourteen grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Police Remand Five Juveniles

Two cases of criminal mischief were noted by the Vernonia Police Department in the reports of actions the past week—both involving juveniles and occurring at the Union Oil bulk plant.

The first incident, February 15, involved a chain and padlock being removed from the fencing around the plant. The chain and padlock were recovered from two juveniles, who were turned over to juvenile authorities.

The following night, February 16, a neighbor reported three youths were atop one of the storage tanks. Investigation by the police department disclosed that a valve had been opened atop one of the tanks, and that a smaller valve had been opened on a gas pump.

Three youths were remanded to juvenile authorities following investigation of this incident.
