## The People Speak . . .

I have been advised through "Oregon Alert No. 1" issued by the National Association to Keep and Bear Arms, of an extremely dangerous bill which was introduced in the Oregon Senate last month, known as Senate Bill No. 80. Mind you now, this was not a notification by any of our lawmakers in Salem, but by an organization dedicated to protecting the freedom of law-abiding citizens who, so far have enjoyed the right to keep and bear arms.

This police-state proposal would give police officers the authority to carry in their vehicles blank search warrants, already signed by a judge, GUNS or other personal property of a citizen could be searched and seized by any officer as they so desired. All the officer would have to do would be to call in on his radio, and by means of a tape recording made of the call, complete the warrant (Sec. 83). Thus the police would be able to break down the door in the middle of the night or at any time on the spur of the moment, to forcibly enter private homes and seize guns and other personal property.

Part of Section 82 of SB 80 reads as follows: "Sec. 82 (Permissible objects of search and seizure) The following are subject to search and seizure under Sections 81 to 119 of this Act: (3) weapons or other things used or likely to be used as means of committing a crime."

Write or bring your letter of protest to SB. No. 80 to the Vernonia Eagle and I will deliver it in person March 5, in Salem where a hearing is being held on the bill on that date, or write directly to Betty Browne, Chairman, Senate Judiciary Committee, Legislative Assembly, Salem, Oregon 97310. Be sure and sign your name and address to all letters.

Ruby F. Fowler was born August 4, 1908 at Wilsonville, Oregon, the daughter of Thomas Charles and Cora D. Cole Biggs. As a young girl she moved with her parents to Bend. The family came to Clatskanie, Oregon by covered wagon. She started her schooling there, but moved to Vernonia and finished her education here.

She was united to Clifford Fowler, October 18, 1925 in St. Helens. After their marriage, they moved to the Riverview area.

Mrs. Fowler has been active in the community and in church work since coming to Vernonia. She was a charter member of the Vernonia Bible Church.

She and her family owned and operated the Pine Cone Cafe for six years, and later the Coffee Break, selling that business in 1970.

She is survived by: Her husband, Clifford of Vernonia; three sons, Harold and Delbert, both of Vernonia, and Lawrence of Portland. Four grandchildren survive, as does one brother, Carl Biggs of Kelso, Washington.

## Cities Share in Highway Funds

The semiannual apportioning of the State Highway Fund to the incorporated cities of Oregon was made by the State Highway Commission.

Funds to be released by the commission total \$8,003,972.59, which will be distributed to 236 incorporated cities in Oregon whose combined population now totals 1,247,350. The allocation is based on the statutory 12 percent for the period July 1 through December 31, 1972.

The fund comes from the following sources: motor vehicle registration and operators' license fees, gasoline tax, use fuel tax, motor carrier fees, and fines and penalties collected for violations of the size and weight statutes where complaints were made by the Highway Division weighmasters.

Population figures are as of December 31, 1972, and are furnished by the Center for Population Research and Census, Portland State University.

Cities receiving sums of \$10,000 or more include the following from Columbia County: Rainier, with a population of 1,750, \$11,051.21; Scappoose, 2,175, \$13,735.07; St. Helens, 6,600, \$41,878.84; Vernonia, 1,645, \$10,388.14.
