



Course Set on Tots' Behavior

Parents of toddlers are frequently puzzled by their behavior. Is it normal? What should I expect? How do I get him to cooperate? How much discipline? These are only a few of the questions that parents ask.

To help parents of the one to three year old find answers to these and other questions, the Extension Service will offer a correspondence home study course, Parents and Toddlers, according to Carol A. Ashley, Columbia County Extension Agent. The course will consist of four lessons. Each lesson will include a work sheet to help the parents become involved in the learning about toddlers. A brief report back is included with the lesson to be mailed back to the county office before the next lesson is sent.

Titles of the four lessons are: What are Toddlers Like? Parents are Teachers. Play is What It's All About. Living with Children.

Any parent of a child under three years of age may enroll by writing Extension Service, Courthouse, St. Helens, giving name, address and age of child or children.

Mrs. Ashley says that this course provides parents an opportunity to learn more about children in the privacy of their own homes and at their convenience.

A fee of one dollar will help cover costs for materials and secretarial assistance. However, enrollments will be accepted without fee if the enrollee is unable to pay.

Wood Carver's Art Displayed

Excellent examples of the wood carver's art were shown to 55 members of Columbia County Chapter 499, American Association of Retired Persons, meeting in Shrine Hall, St. Helens, February 20. The work was that of Vince Harris of Columbia City, and the speaker his wife, Mamie.

Wood carving was a self-developed skill for Harris, she said, whose occupation was ornamental art plastering—the kind of work done on theatres and public buildings. He learned the trade from his father who in turn had learned it from his father.

Having whittled from boyhood, Vince made canoes and violins in his spare time. He later carved birds and animals both on plaques and in the round, carved gun stocks, mounted antlers and built three boats, one of which was given to the Search and Rescue unit in Hood River, where it is still in use. He also made many articles of furniture for their home.

While there is money for the expert in wood carving, Mrs. Harris said her husband got most of his satisfaction from carving as a hobby and giving the results to his friends.
