The Columbia County Board of
Commissioners met in scheduled
session February 28, with Chair-
man Fred Foshaug presiding. Com-
missioner Jack Minkoff and sec-
retary Gloria Salvey (deputy clerk)
present. Commissioner Ahlborn was
absent for a portion of the meeting
attending an emergency meeting of
the Columbia-Willamette Air Pol-
lution Authority.

Commissioner Minkoff moved
and Commissioner Foshaug second-
ed the minutes of the meeting of
February 21 be approved. Motion
carried.

Purchase Order No. 1719 was ap-
proved for repairs of a broken shaft
in the D-8 Cat, at an estimated cost
of \$900.

Commissioner Minkoff moved
and Commissioner Foshaug second-
ed the offer of \$1,250 received from
David A. Thompson for the pur-
chase of Tax Lot 2374-3 be accepted.
Motion carried.

Police Actions Noted by Chief

A summary of activities of the
Vernonia Police Department for the
month of February, as submitted to
the city council under the signature
of Chief of Police Jack Cunnig-
ham, listed the following:

For the month, six VBR warnings
were issued and two citations; two
warnings for stop signs; one warn-
ing and four citations, other moving
violations; 19 warnings, with four
citations, for violation of vehicle
laws; and one warning and three
citations for parking violations.

There were six citations given for
DUIL's, with three arrests made;
five warnings given for disorderly
conduct and two for other municipal
violations.

There was one misdemeanor
complaint of theft cleared; one auto
theft cleared; one assault cleared;
and one burglary. Criminal mis-
chief complaints totaled three with
two cleared by arrest and one
unfounded. Two complaints of car-
rying concealed weapons were list-
ed with one an actual offense and
the other, unfounded.

The summary showed 11 juvenile
referrals made in February; 24
miscellaneous complaints; and one
missing person located. The de-
partment investigated four traffic
accidents; made five motorists
assist; four assists to other depart-
ments; one assist to ambulance and
six assists to the fire department.
Ten abandoned vehicles were
reported, seven vacation home
checks made; and five businesses
found open after hours.

The police car logged 3367 miles
for the month while volunteer offi-
cers contributed 40 paid and 87
non-paid hours to the department.
