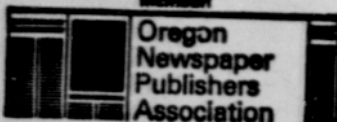

"Criminal process revision favored: This headline in the Oregonian March 27, under a Salem dateline proves again, that it does pay to let our legislators know what pending legislation we approve of, and what legislation we disapprove of.

Quoting from the above news item: "The Senate Judiciary Committee approved a revised criminal procedure code for Oregon Monday and sent it to the Senate floor with a do-pass recommendation."

It deleted sections permitting emergency vehicular and open lands searches when not authorized by a court warrant. The committee also knocked out a provision for emergency searches authorized by a judge via telephone.

These were the two provisions that we were concerned with and opposed to in Senate Bill No. 80. The invasion of the law abiding citizen's right to unauthorized search and seizure has been struck down again. We do not approve of the unconstitutional invasion of our personal rights.

So, again, we can be sure that our vehicles nor our homes will be searched, and our guns will not be seized when the warrant specifies something else to be seized.

Rites Friday For J. E. Rose

Funeral services for James E. (Bud) Rose, 71-year-old resident of Forest Grove and former resident of Vernonia, were held Friday, March 23, at 1:30 p.m. in the Fuiten Mortuary Chapel in Forest Grove.

The Rev. Richard Perry, pastor of the First Christian Church of Forest Grove, officiated, with Richard Walker serving as soloist.

Committal services followed with vault interment at the Valley Memorial Park Cemetery in Hillsboro. Serving as casket bearers were Merle Cline, Spurge Golden, Weaver Clark, Harry Emmons, Bud Penn, and Bob VanWinkle.

James E. Rose was born August 16, 1901 in Denton, Texas, the son of W.L. and Annie Hudson Rose. He grew up and attended schools in West Texas. He served in the U.S. Army in 1920. Returning from the service, he lived in Hamlin, Texas until his marriage to Myrtle Jenkins, March 15, 1924 in Lamesa, Texas.

After their marriage they moved to Cripple Creek, Colorado where he worked in the gold mines. They moved to Vernonia in November of 1925, where he worked for the Oregon American Lumber Co. until its closure in 1958. Due to illness he retired in 1960.

In 1969 they moved to Forest Grove. Mr. Rose died Monday evening, March 19, at his home in Forest Grove.

Survivors include: His wife, Myrtle of Forest Grove; four sons and one daughter, Mancel Lee Rose of Santa Ana, California, Derrel J. Rose of Forest Grove, Bobby Joe Rose of Beaverton, Jack Greenwood of Beaverton, and Mrs. Jim (Dorothy) Staight of Milwaukee.

Also surviving are 14 grandchildren, three great-grandchildren; and two brothers, Kirby Rose of Rainier, and Carl Rose of Carpinteria, California.

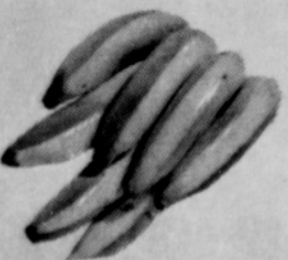

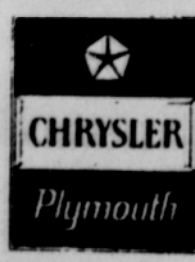
