Bites Noted in Police Reports

nonia Police Department reflect a

A June 1 report noted two young
girls bitten by rats while asleep in
the upstairs bedrooms in a State
Avenue dwelling. The girls, Lauri
Miller, 11, and Sandra Miller, the
daughters of Ada M. Miller, have
been kept under observation by
health authorities for fear of rabies
or other ill effects from the bites.
Police Chief Jack Cunningham re-
ported Monday that to his knowl-
edge, no ill effects had shown up at
that time.

Also on June 1, a report filed by
Laura Carmichael, noted that a
vandal, or vandals, had thrown a
rock through the rear window of a
vehicle parked in her yard. The
suspect(s) were unidentified.

The breakage of six windows—
four on the north side and two on the
south—at Lincoln Grade School was
reported May 31. Investigation led
to the referral of a 13-year-old boy
to juvenile authorities following his
admission of guilt.

Hansen Service Read Wednesday

Hans O. Hansen, 84-year-old resi-
dent of the Vernonia area since
1936, died Wednesday, May 30, at
the Veteran's Hospital in Portland,
following an extended illness.

Funeral services for Mr. Hansen
were held at the Fuiten Mortuary
Chapel in Vernonia, Saturday, June
2, at 2 p.m.

The Rev. Jack Carlson, pastor of
the Evangelical Church of Vernonia,
conducted the services with
Mrs. Lloyd Thomas, organist. Con-
cluding rites and interment were at
the Vernonia Memorial Cemetery
with Albin Bergstrom, Harry Cul-
bertson, Noble Dunlap, Loren Stiff,
Lloyd Thomas, and Charles Fugate,
all members of the Vernonia Bar-
racks, Veterans of World War I,
serving as pallbearers.

Mr. Hansen was a native of
Skog, Norway where he was born
July 1, 1888. He spent his early life
there, then came to the United
States in 1905, landing in Boston. He
went by train from Boston to Kie-
ven, Montana to the home of his
cousins, where he stayed to learn
the language and customs of this
country.

In 1906 he left his cousins and
went to Helena where he worked in
construction, then a year later went
to Seattle where he lived for about
five years. During this time he en-
tered into steam engine and boiler
work and part of this time was spent
in Alaska on "carrying ships."

Mr. Hansen later spent the bal-
ance of his working years working
as a millwright helping in the con-
struction of many sawmills in Ore-
gon, Washington, and California.

He was married to Mabel Geddes
in Portland on November 21, 1914.
She preceded him in death here in
1966. In 1967 he was married to
Emma Ingermansen and they first
lived several years on Timber
Route, then moved into Vernonia.
She died July 6, 1972, and, after her
death, Mr. Hansen was at White
City until he entered the Veterans
Hospital in Portland.

Mr. Hansen was a member of the
Veterans of World War I, Barracks
2525, and the American Legion,
Vernonia Post. He was baptized in
the Lutheran Church.

Surviving are: brothers, Andrew
Hansen of Benson, Minnesota, Ivar
and Mike Welo of Naugatuck,
Connecticut, Peder Hansen of Titus-
ville, Florida; David Welo, and
two sisters, all of Norway; and a
number of nieces, nephews and
cousins.
