YOUR SENATOR REPORTS

Last week I was pleased to announce that the negotiations between the State of Oregon and B.A. McPhillips of McMinnville have resulted in an agreement which will give to the state two miles of beach access, including Cape Kiwanda.

Representative Phil Lang, D-Portland, who serves with me as co-chairman of Ways and Means, and I will submit and recommend the proposal to Ways and Means for their final approval.

I have been following these negotiations closely which were instigated by Governor Tom McCall and carried on by Glenn Jackson, chairman of the State Highway Commission.

Actually, there will be very little if any state funds needed to complete the transaction which calls for \$793,000 for the property which consists of two miles west of McPhillips Drive, and includes the famous headland of Cape Kiwanda. The money will come largely from the United States Bureau of Recreation funds which has been made available for transactions of this nature.

I personally was delighted with the cooperation that we received during the negotiations which has led to such a favorable solution of a difficult problem.

Jackson has assured me that the Highway Commission would erect needed fences to ensure the greatest possible protection against accidents and loss of life, consistent also with protecting the photogenic qualities of the Cape.

The people of the State of Oregon are blessed with a gorgeous coast line that now can be enjoyed by everyone for generations to come. We have secured two miles of magnificent beach front, and at the same time the state keeps the scenic and majestic cape in public ownership under this transaction.

I have argued for many, many years that the beaches belong to the people of our beautiful state and are not just for the pleasure of special

Sports Cars to Run June 9-10

While the entire 300-car event will provide plenty of thrills and excitement, most fans will be focusing on action during race six of Sunday's racing slate, according to Robert Ames, Rose Festival auto racing director. This will be the race for the coveted Rose Cup, and points in the Gold Rush Series.

The races, scheduled at Portland International Raceway Saturday, June 9, and Sunday, June 10, are the 13th annual, and are sanctioned for National points by the Sports Car Club of America. Qualifying is set for Saturday with races Sunday.

Race Six, for the Rose Cup, will feature a host of big-bore American machines such as Corvettes and Camaros, along with super-fast, exotic prototypes specially built for international endurance racing.

One of these prototypes will be piloted by 1972 Rose Cup winner Monte Shelton, Portland automobile dealer.

Initially conceived in 1967, Shelton's Hanna Industries Porsche 910/8 is a 1972 model of the cars which placed second in the European-American International Championship of Makes in 1967 and won that prestigious title outright in 1969. Currently, Porsche is preparing to defend the Can-Am title won last year with a car slightly larger than Shelton's.

Powered by a new 1981 cc fuel-injected engine developing 272 (DIN) horsepower at 9000 rpm, the Shelton Porsche should reach speeds of 160-170.

Savings Bonds Sales Increase

Oregon continues to show solid support of the United States Savings Bond program. The April sales figures released by the U.S. Treasury Department reveal that Oregonians purchased \$5,140,358 during the month. The April sales boost the year-to-date sales to \$19,025,853. This is an increase of \$2 million over the like period of 1972 which was Oregon's banner year. Of the April total, Columbia County purchased \$61,855, to bring their year-to-date sales up to \$119,711.

The broad scope of the Oregon support is most gratifying to local treasury representatives. Thirty-one of Oregon's 36 counties have exceeded their monthly goals year-to-date.

Nationally, U.S. Savings Bonds are enjoying the same success. April sales of \$562 million raised sales for the first four months to \$2,313 million, an all-time record. Currently, there are \$59.3 billion worth of Savings Bonds held by Americans. This is an increase of \$3.4 billion since April of 1972.

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Board of Commissioners

(Unapproved Minutes)

The Columbia County Board of Commissioners met in scheduled session May 30 with Chairman Fred Foshaug presiding, Commissioners Minkoff and Ahlborn, and secretary Gloria Salvey (deputy clerk) present.

At the request of the board, Phil Minor and Frank LeMont met with them and with Andy Pavelek, Soil Conservation Service. LeMont discussed the services his department receives from the SCS, and indicated he felt the services should be continued, although not charged specifically to one department.

Minor stated that he uses the services of the SCS perhaps two or three days a month, with regard to soil conditions in various parts of the county. Minor indicated that he does not use the SCS services as much now as he has done in the past. Minor indicated he felt the services should be retained, although charged to the non-departmental category rather than any particular department.

Martin Sells, county counsel, together with Mr. Ollila, met with the board. Sells explained to those present that Mr. Ollila had encountered difficulties with regard to the 20-foot setback requirement and was requesting a variance. After discussion, Sells advised Ollila to meet with the planning administrator, the building inspector, and the sanitarians to further discuss the problems.

At 10 a.m. bids were opened for the Viewcrest Subdivision Street Improvements as advertised. One bid was received from St. Helens Paving Company, in the total sum of \$38,523.80. At the recommendation of the roadmaster, Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded the bid be awarded to St. Helens Paving Company. Motion carried. Mr. McBride was questioned as to whether he would be able to provide the necessary performance bond, and replied in the affirmative.

Phil Walrod, Tri-County Senior Citizens, met with the board regarding space on the third floor of the old courthouse building, and was advised that because of fire regulations, no permanent occupancy could be allowed.

Mel Ivey met with the board to discuss proposed plans for construction of additional airondack "pods" at Camp Wilkerson.

Robert Lucas, district attorney, met with the board and with Keith Thompson to discuss an invoice for \$53.80 for transcript of appeal on the Nelson condemnation case. Lucas felt this was a part of right-of-way acquisition costs, and should therefore be paid from road department funds. After considerable discussion, Thompson indicated he would have the claim paid from the road department funds.

Thompson presented personnel action forms terminating George Mann as deputy roadmaster, effective June 30, 1973, and hiring Sam Hollinger as deputy roadmaster effective July 1. Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded to approve these actions. Motion carried.

Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded the following Purchase Orders be approved: 2010 - St. Helens Paving, pre-mix, \$6,000; 2011 - Chevron Asphalt, asphalt, \$2,257.50; 2009 - Dept. of General Services, 3 pickups, 2-1970, 1-1972, \$4,400; 2005 - Traffic Safety Supply, stop signs and deer crossings, \$820; 1999 - Albina Fuel, Coherex (duet emulsion), \$1,960. Motion carried.

District Attorney Robert Lucas met with the board to discuss the provisions of SB 15, which requires all meetings to be open to the public. Lucas indicated this bill has

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passed both houses, and would probably be signed by the governor today. He discussed some of the requirements of the bill, and indicated that at the District Attorney's Association meeting, a set of minimum standard requirements would be discussed so that all counties would be under the same standards.

Lucas also discussed space provisions now being made by alterations. He suggested that perhaps he and Judge Mason should meet with the board to discuss final use of the room currently being used by Judge Mason as his office, and tentatively to be used as a jury room, after remodeling has been completed.

At the recommendation of Ron Reeves, Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded surface mining permit be issued to Paul Zimmerly Road Construction, and renewal of surface mining permit be granted to Pacific Building Materials. Motion carried.

Ron Reeves also discussed the general advisory board of CRAG, indicating that he would like to be appointed as the county's representative to this board. Commissioner Ahlborn moved and Commissioner Minkoff moved that Ron Reeves be appointed as county representative to the CRAG general advisory board, to replace Don Walrod and that a letter of appreciation be sent Walrod. Motion carried.

Jeri Johnson, accountant, met with the board to question the proposed termination of one of the EEA employees at the road department. Commissioner Minkoff agreed to discuss this further with Keith Thompson to determine the reasoning why this is being done.

Mrs. Johnson also advised that Allen Jilison had filed a request for hearing with the Employment Division, after being denied unemployment benefits.

Phil Minor met with the board to present an order for signature refunding a \$15 lot inspection fee to Eugene Sullivan, because of previous ruling banning sub-surface sewage disposal systems below the 30-foot contour level. Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded Order No. 29-73 refunding the fee. Motion carried.

Minor also submitted report of findings in the appeals of Nehalem Valley Sanitary Service and Claud S. Willis, from denial by the board to issue solid waste franchise collection permits. These were taken under advisement for review by the board.

An order was signed appointing Cody L. Brownlee as temporary dog control officer for the period May 29 to June 4, 1973.

Liquor license applications were recommended for the Goble Tavern for a RMBA and PB licenses. Commissioner Ahlborn moved

and Commissioner Minkoff seconded the offer of \$750 received from Earnest Allen be denied as an insufficient amount. Motion carried. Said offer was for Lots 10, 11 and 12, Block 2, Corey Addition to Vernonia.

Commissioner Ahlborn moved and Commissioner Minkoff seconded an order reimbursing taxes in the sum of \$2.14 be signed in favor of Jesse Waldrop, resulting from duplicate payment. Motion carried.

Block 7, First Addition to Vernonia, received from Charley Hickman, be accepted. Motion carried.

Commissioner Ahlborn moved and Commissioner Minkoff seconded an order reimbursing taxes in the sum of \$2.14 be signed in favor of Jesse Waldrop, resulting from duplicate payment. Motion carried.

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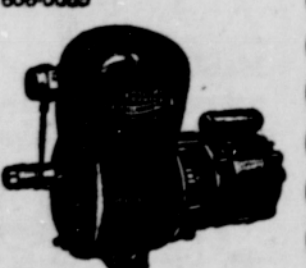
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
