

Annual Indian Festival Slated

The fourteenth annual Indian Festival of Arts, a cultural gathering of Indians from various tribes throughout the country, will be held in La Grande, Oregon, June 14-16.

Hundreds of Indians and other visitors will converge on the town of 10,000, located in the midst of the scenic Grande Ronde Valley on Interstate 80 and the little town will once again come alive with a parade and festivity, just as in ancient times.

The valley, known as KOP KOP-PA to Indians, is the site of ancient meeting grounds for Indians of several tribes. KOP KOPPA (Nez Perce for "at the cottonwoods") was a valley reserved for peace between the tribes. Entering the valley meant leaving weapons behind.

Featured at this year's festival will be a wide assortment of Indian arts and crafts, foods and ceremonial dancing. The theme for the festival will be "Then and Now," and entertainment will include an expose of the Indian life style, both modern and ancient.

Forester Set to Speak to AARP

German Arts Festival Due At Portland State June 23

The second German Arts Festival on the Pacific, a week of German cultural events co-sponsored by Portland State University, the City of Portland, the German Aid Society and the Goethe Institute, Munich, Germany, will be held in Portland, June 23-30.

The first German Arts Festival, two years ago, was launched with a grant from the Goethe Institute to honor Dr. H. Frederick Peters, PSU professor of German and comparative literature. Dr. Peters also heads the Central European Studies Center and founded the Deutsche Sommerschule an Pazifik, a summer program now in its 16th year.

Puppets, films, vocal and instrumental music, drama, mime, special art and documentary exhibits highlight this year's festival. It will open at 8 p.m. Saturday, June 23 with a performance by Albrecht Roser, a puppeteer from Stuttgart, in the Caroline Berg Swann Auditorium at the Portland Art Museum 1219 SW Park. Roser's "Clown Gustaf and Ensemble" will present a random series of comedy and other scenes intended for an audience over 15 years of age. The puppeteer, who performed in Portland's first German Arts Festival, draws heavily on theater, dance, cabaret, and pantomime to provide entertainment which he describes as "not language bound."

A series of short experimental films produced by young German film makers will be presented at 8 p.m. Sunday, June 24 in PSU's Smith Center Ballroom. Films include "Speed," "Short Introduction to a Happy Life," and "Monuments of Light."

Violinist Denes Zsigmondy, Hungarian born musician, and a visiting professor in the University of Washington School of Music, will perform at 8 p.m. Monday, June 25 in the Swann Auditorium at the Portland Art Museum. Zsigmondy, who has traveled throughout Europe, Asia, and North and South America, will be accompanied by his wife Anneliese Nissen.

Works of German poets Goethe and Morike, set to music by Franz Schubert and Hugo Wolf, will be presented by soprano Sue McBerry in an 8 p.m. concert, Tuesday, June 26 in the Swann Auditorium at the Portland Art Museum. She will be accompanied by Tomas Svoboda, assistant music professor at PSU.

A one-man variety show using German mime and clown will be staged at 8 p.m. Wednesday, June 27 in the Smith Center Ballroom at PSU by F.J. Bogner of Munich. By use of clown scenes with and without words, Bogner's series of satiric pantomimes present a multifaceted picture of our time.

The Portland Shakespearean Company will add variety to the festivities with a production of Bertolt Brecht's "Galileo" at 8 p.m. Thursday and Friday, June 28 and 29 in PSU's Shattuck Theatre. Based on the life of the astronomer-physicist, the play zeros in on the conflicts that develop with the church and state when he reveals his theory which places the sun in the center of the universe. Performed in English, the play is directed by Tom Hill, former artistic director for the American Theater Company.

The Collegium Vocale, a group of six singers from Cologne, will present a concert of contemporary and renaissance music at 8 p.m. Saturday, June 30 in the Swann Auditorium at the Portland Art Museum. The recording artists have toured throughout Europe and the Scandinavian countries.

A number of special exhibits will be on display during the week-long festival. "German Expressionism," an exhibit of about 30 prints on loan from Gordon Gilkey, member of the faculty of Oregon State University, may be viewed at the Portland Art Museum. It will feature works from 1910-1933 by Max Beckmann, Lovis Corinth, Max Pechstein, Karl Hofer and Karl Schmidt-Rottluff.

An exhibit prepared by the State Museum of Applied Art in Munich entitled "Protopolis," showing the present state of the modern city and how it should be changed, will be on display at the German Aid Society, 714 SW 11th Ave.

Exhibits portraying the lives and work of Sigmund Freud and Hermann Hesse have been prepared by the Goethe Institute and will be on display in the PSU library and at Marylhurst College, respectively.

All exhibits are free and open to the public. Tickets for the other festival events may be purchased at the PSU Box Office. Admission to the films is \$1 for everyone. All other events are \$2 for general admission and \$1 for students.

Mirrors Useful In Home Decor

Trickery used to deceive the eye for a good cause can be perfectly legal and moral, in the opinion of Carol A. Ashley, Columbia County Extension Agent.

Mirrors are the "trick" the home economist suggests using to make a small room look larger, or a dark room seem lighter.

While adding actual square footage may be the most desirable answer to a too-small-room problem, Mrs. Ashley notes that this may not be financially feasible. But mirrors can make a room seem almost twice as large, and add to the decor at the same time.

In a dining room, a large mirror can be placed at one end, so it will reflect the table, chairs and other furniture. If the mirror also reflects the windows, the room will seem lighter and more airy.

In an entry hall, a framed mirror can be hung above a narrow decorative shelf fastened to the wall. Not only will the hall seem larger, but a last-minute grooming check point has been created, along with a wall arrangement.

A bathroom can usually use another mirror. With luck, the additional mirror can be placed so it allows a clear view of the back of the head—a real boon for hair-setting and combing.

Any dark corner of the house can be brightened if a mirror can be placed to reflect the light from the window.

Menus from Vernonia Cooks

Clarence and Ramona Shirley moved from Independence, Missouri to Vernonia five years ago. They have five children: Kathy, 12; Debbie, 10; Tony, 6; Avery, 5; and Denise Ramona, 3.

Clarence drives a lift truck for Crown Zellerbach at Wauna. In addition to being a member of the Vernonia Home Extension Unit, Ramona is a mother coordinator for the four-year-old pre-school and is always involved and working on community projects.

Ramona cheerfully gave three of her good recipes: Jamasetta; Scalloped Corn; and Cake Mix and Jello Cake.

Jamasetta:
3 or 4 pork steaks, cubed
1/2 C chopped onion
2 T chili powder
1 lg. can tomatoes, cut up
1 pk. cooked noodles
10 or 12 sm. slices Velveta Parmesan cheese
Fry pork cubes, set aside, saute onions, add tomatoes and dash of salt, pepper and chili powder; return pork cubes and simmer 20 min.

In a casserole dish put a layer of cooked noodles, layer of meat sauce, layer of cheese, sprinkle with parmesan; repeat layers and bake in 350 degree oven till hot and bubbly.

Scalloped Corn:
4 ears fresh corn or
1 can (2 cups) whole kernel corn (drained)

1/2 C chopped onion
1/4 C chopped green pepper
2 T margarine
2 T flour
1 t salt
1/2 t paprika
1/4 t dry mustard
dash pepper
3/4 C milk
1 egg, slightly beaten
1 T butter, melted
Saute and stir onions and green pepper in 2 T butter. Remove from heat, stir in flour and seasonings, cook over low heat till mixture is bubbly.

Remove from heat, gradually stir in milk. Heat till boiling, stirring constantly for one minute. Stir in corn and egg. Pour in ungreased 1 qt. casserole. Combine cracker crumbs and 1 T melted butter, sprinkle over corn mixture. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 30-35 minutes.

Cake Mix and Jello Cake
1 pk. pineapple cake mix
1 sm. pkg. lemon or lime Jello
2/3 C water
2/3 C oil
1 t lemon flavoring
Put all ingredients in bowl and mix. Pour in 9x13" cake pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. When done, take out and poke holes on top and pour icing over hot cake.

Icing:
Pineapple juice or lemonade and powder sugar. Make icing thin and pour over hot cake.
(You may mix flavors as you like.)

Project Aids In Child Care

Adults concerned with quality child care might consider investments in the future suggests extension home economist Carol Ashley. The investment she recommends is sharing capabilities of understanding and caring for children with young people through 4-H or other youth activities.

Goals of a recently revised 4-H project are for members to gain an understanding of young children, to learn skills which can be applied later in life at home or babysitting, and to learn that working with pre-schoolers can be fun. Members receive direction from adult leaders. Mrs. Ashley feels that leaders for the project should have particular concern for human development.

In the Fun With Children project, 9- to 12-year-old youth select pre-school children to be their "fun friends." They choose one or more types of activities in which to work with the children: stories and make believe, art and music, toys and play, and nature and animal activities. Project materials for leaders and members offer suggestions for activities in each of these areas.

The project offers beginning training which can be applied as babysitters and eventually as parents, Mrs. Ashley feels. She adds that it also fills a void in families without younger brothers or sisters by establishing a "fun friend" relationship.

Clothes Buying Hints Offered

When it comes to finding just the right dress of the right size and the right color and style, older women often have to do a lot of looking.

Carol A. Ashley, Columbia County Extension home economist, offers some suggestions for those who face this problem.

Finding the right fit becomes a problem because figures change with age. Some women may need to wear a different size or a different type garment than they are accustomed to wearing. For example, a "Misses" dress rather than a "Women's" dress might fit better, or perhaps a "half-size" rather than a regular size.

Women who still can't find a satisfactory style in a size that fits should tell the store manager. He may be able to order the right garment. Requests help reflect the clothing needs of older women back to the manufacturer. This in turn influences what appears on the market.

Consider other colors than the ones previously worn. Because of changing hair color and skin tones, older women may be able to wear colors which were previously unflattering.

Look for safety ideas and avoid full loose sleeves, belts and scarves. Styles which catch on door handles and furniture should also be avoided.
