SPEAKING TO THE CONSUMER

Meat in Canned Products. How much meat is in a canned meat product? Check the list of ingredients on the label for the answer. If meat is listed first, it means the percentage of meat is higher than the percentage of any other ingredient. Here are additional clues: "Boned Poultry, Solid Pack" must contain at least 95 percent meat, but "Boned Poultry with Broth" must contain only 80 percent meat. "Corned Beef Hash" must contain at least 35 percent beef. "Spaghetti Sauce and Meat Balls" must have at least 35 percent meat, while "Spaghetti Sauce With Meat" need only contain six percent meat. "Baby Food, Meat and Broth" must contain at least 65 percent meat; "Baby Food, Vegetable and Meat" needs only to contain eight percent meat.

Buying Lawn Seed. A truth-in-labeling law for lawn seed requires that the package show the kinds of seed included; the amount of inert matter, weed seeds, and other-crop seeds; and the germination rate the seed had when it was tested. Use this label information as your guide to quality.

For help in determining what kind of seed will work best on your soil, in sun or shade, and for the amount of foot traffic you anticipate, contact the Oregon State University Extension Agent in your county office.

Who Pays The Insurance? If you are in the process of buying a new home, be sure you know who bears the risk of loss due to fire, wind, and other hazards between the time the purchase option is signed and the deal is completed. If the responsibility for paying the insurance premiums is unclear, you may find yourself owning an uninsured damaged house.

Teenager's Health Coverage. If your teenager is about to graduate from high school, check your family health insurance policy to see how much longer his coverage will continue. Some policies end when a child reaches age 19; other policies end when the young person is no longer a full-time student and dependent upon his parents' financial support. Protection under most family policies ends when a teenager marries or enters the armed forces.

Get It In Writing. If you are getting an estimate for services or repairs, don't accept a verbal quotation. Have the estimate written down and itemized as to what covers labor and what covers materials. The Oregon Consumer Services Division reports that more complaints come in about estimates than any other consumer problem. Without a written estimate, recourse is very difficult.

Safety for the Baby. Buying a baby crib? Look for a model that states on the label it meets new federal safety regulations. These cribs have slats spaced to prevent a child from getting caught between the slats. The side rail height guards against a baby falling or rolling out of the crib, even when the rail is in a lowered position. The new regulations also standardize the size of the crib. This will lead to standardized mattress sizes and the problem of improperly fitting mattresses, eliminating the danger of a baby getting trapped between a mattress and the crib frame.

Help from the District Attorney. Your local District Attorney is charged under Oregon's Consumer Protection Act to handle misleading and deceptive trade practices. Some consumers are reluctant to report an unfair business practice, however, because they think they might be charged a legal fee or their names will be used publicly. This is no problem. The District Attorney is a public official who accepts no fees, and you will not become publicly involved unless you sign a formal complaint.
