

# AROUND THE

#### LIVESTOCK LOSSES INCREASE

Local livestock producers are reporting growing incidences of livestock losses in recent weeks. These seem to stem from two causestheft and predators.

While theft has been a constant nagging problem to livestock producers over the years, recent high meat prices coupled with increased value of individual animals themselves has made the theft matter take on greater significance. Theft seems to take two possible directions-the taking of live animals and butchering of animals where found with removal of some or all edible portions.

Producers are reporting young calves to be particularly vulnerable this time of year. They are small enough to be readily caught and transported easily and quickly. In addition they are generally too young to have been branded or marked in any way that would provide identification at some later

Prevention of theft can be aided by keeping animals under close surveilance, by avoiding grazing in areas close to roadsides and other situations providing easy access, particularly where isolated from

Early marking or branding of animals in some manner that cannot be hidden provides some deterent and increase the possibility of proving theft and aiding in recovery of animals. Brands and marks so used need to be recorded with the State Department of Agriculture under provisions of Oregon law. Complete copies of brand books listing recorded current brands and forms for making preliminary application for a registered brand can be secured from county extension

Changes in predator control programs have resulted in greater losses of livestock with young animals again being the primary target. Most of these losses have occurred with lambs and poultry but there are incidences of calves and even older animals being attacked. Most of the predations have come from coyotes with some incidence of fox damage on poultry. A growing problem is that of livestock sses from marauding dogs.

BARBED WIRE ANNIVERSARY It was 100 years ago that the idea for modern barbed wire was born and later patented by Joseph F. Glidden.

Barbed wire enabled men to fence the Plains and helped turn the region into a place of arable farming and superior livestock breeds.

The story of barbed wire is almost as tangled as the wire itself. But Glidden's role is clear, for he was the one who discovered how to make a reliable, commercial version of the product. The important feature of his pa-tent was the novel way of holding

the barbs in place. He twisted spurs around a strand of smooth wire, then locked them in position with a second strand wrapped around the The operation could be performed

by machine, and after some initial skepticism, distributors in the West began ordering barbed wire by the The man who made it all possible

was born on January 18, 1813 in Charlestown, New Hampshire. Moving west in 1842 as an itinerant thresher, he settled on a farm in De Kalb County, Illinois, 2 years later. He got the idea for his invention at the De Kalb County Fair in 1873 where he saw an early type of barbed wire and decided that it

could be improved. Glidden sold half interest in his invention to a neighbor in 1875. A year later he sold the remaining half interest to a Massachusetts firm for \$60,000 plus a royalty for

the life of the patent.

Although Glidden himself made and marketed barbed wire only for a short while, he had amassed a fortune by 1891 when the patent expired.

At one time he dabbled in local politics, and his business ventures included farms and ranches in Illinois and Texas, a bank, a grist mill and the Glidden Hotel of which

he was builder and owner. But when Joseph Glidden died on October 9, 1906, he owed his reputation to the fencing material that helped tame the west.

#### Policeman's Blunder

Officer Harrison halted a speeding motorist and gave him a tick-et. But he failed to notice that the man was intoxicated. Scarcely five minutes later, the same motorist drove his car through a red traffic light and knocked down a woman

Could the woman hold the city legally liable for the accident be cause of the officer's blunder?

"The city is supposed to provide police protection," she argued in a court hearing. "That's what we pay taxes for. If the officer hadn't let that drunken driver get away, I would never have gotten hurt.



But the court disagreed, saying the law simply does not recognize

this kind of a claim. It is true that all members of the community are entitled to reasonable police protection. But this is a general, not a specific, right. It does not mean that each victim of a crime, if he can point to some police error, can collect damages from the city govern-

In one unusual case, the family of a suicide victim tried to blame the city because the police had missed a chance to prevent the tragedy. They said officers had come out to investigate a family quarrel, then left with things still unsettled

But the city was exonerated. The court said even if the officers should have stayed longer, they still could not fairly have foreseen that the man would take his
