Vermonia Eagle Record Run of Shad Reported

Shad have been reported ascending the Columbia River in record numbers this past week. Some 46,146 shad were counted up the fish ladders at Bonneville Dam on June 12, the most ever recorded for one day. A run of nearly 35,000 fish was counted on the sixth of the month, and runs of more than 20,000 were recorded on several other days this month.

The run started six weeks earlier than last year and has already topped the 273,000 fish run counted over the ladders during the past season. Although no one knows how long this surge may continue, it wouldn't take long at current rates to equal or surpass the all-time record season shad run of 1965 when more than 617,000 shad went past Bonneville.
