



Sel-Mor Inc., publishers of the Scappoose Spotlight, Vernonia Eagle, Senior Citizen Five Area News and the Hook & Line, announce that due to a shortage of newsprint a new look is in store for these publications.

Effective with the first issues of July, the Spotlight and Eagle will be narrower, but same depth, papers In the past, the papers have featured a 1634" width of reading material with an overall width of 171/2 inches per page. As of the July 5 issue, the papers will be 15" overall with a printing width of 14", ac-cording to Larry Garner, editor of the Vernonia Eagle.

The change is due to a change in the width of newsprint rolls received by their central printing plant, Tualatin-Yamhill Press in Hillsboro. T-Y Press prints all four of the Sel-Mor publications.

Garner continued by saying, "After serious study, Sel-Mor decided to adopt a seven-column format for the papers. At the present time the papers are both an eight-column format. It is the feeling of the officials of Sel-Mor that the sevencolumn format will offer easier readibility for readers than the eight columns printed in the same

The Vernonia City Council con-tinued with the second session of The new rate structure sets the what may be the longest council minimum business license at \$30 per year, with an additional fee of \$3 per year per employee over two. The new ordinance also provides for a 10 percent per month late charge

on license renewals. With city business licenses coming 629 July 1 (billed semi-annually under current ordinance) the council voted to continue the meeting until Friday evening to allow passage of the new ordinance prior to date of license renewal (July 1).

Interrogation of residents of the hotel-including one apparent witness to the altercation-ambulance attendants and neighbors was continuing Tuesday morning by Vernonia Police Chief Jack Cunningham and Patrolman Lee Akers. Akers was the first officer on the scene of the incident.

According to a statement released by District Attorney Robert Lucas, the Vernonia Police Department, assisted by the Columbia County Sheriff's department and his office, will continue investigation this week.

In addition to physical evidence gathered and forwarded to the Oregon State Crime Lab for evaluation, the DA's office video-taped the scene of the incident.

## County's **O&C Share** Increased

In a surprise move, Columbia County was notified by Wendell Wyatt, First District Congressman. that \$150,000 in additional funds were forthcoming from O&C funds. These funds are distributed to Oregon and California land grant counties, and stem from the day of the

Oregon and California railroad. While the county, which relies heavily on these funds for revenue, had expected to receive approximately \$30,000, the large increase came as welcome news.

According to County Commission Chairman Fred Foshaug, there are multitudes of areas in the county where the monies can be expended
