Students Told 'Register Now'

Are you thinking about starting college in the fall? Or transferring from one college to another? If you are, do it now. There isn't much time left.

Some 9,979 openings still remain in Oregon colleges and universities for late-deciding freshmen and 11th hour transfer students, according to a May survey conducted by the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education (WICHE).

According to the WICHE study, application deadlines for the fall semester range from May 8 to October 6 at 25 Oregon higher education institutions.

College officials point out, however, that vacancies are open only to students who meet the individual college's requirements. And if a student has already applied to a college or university and has been turned down, he should not reapply at that college.

An exception to the more formal admissions requirements would be the increasingly popular open door admissions policy. Last year, 19 western colleges reported open admissions policies. This year the number quadrupled. Eighty-one institutions said they have either no limit or open door admissions for the fall. In other words, these schools have space for a great many students.

The WICHE study, which canvassed 447 undergraduate institutions throughout the 13 western states, reports that approximately 130,000 vacancies are still available for entering freshmen and transfer students. A total of 256 western institutions responded to the survey with 206 reporting vacancies for come-lately applicants.

WICHE is a public agency which helps the 13 western states work together to increase educational opportunities for western youth, to improve programs of universities and colleges, to expand the supply of specialized manpower, and to inform the public of higher education needs.

Board of Commissioners

(Unapproved Minutes)

The Columbia County Board of Commissioners met in scheduled session June 20 with Chairman Fred Foshaug presiding. Commissioners Minkoff and Ahlborn, and secretary Gloria Salvey (deputy clerk) present.

Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded the minutes of the following meetings be approved: Board of Commissioners meeting of June 13; Public hearing on Meadowview Service District SD-1 budget; Public hearing on Columbia County 1973-74 budget. Motion carried.

Miscellaneous claims were approved.

Roadmaster Keith Thompson met with the board to discuss various road department matters. He introduced Ted K. Morgan, whom he plans to hire as Engineering Technician II, effective July 1, at a salary of \$900 per month. Commissioner Ahlborn moved and Commissioner Minkoff seconded to approve the hiring of Morgan. Motion carried.

Thompson presented the approved traffic safety grant application to the board, and advised the starting date had been changed to June 13, 1973 in order to get started by July 1.

As a part of the traffic safety grant, Commissioner Ahlborn moved and Commissioner Minkoff seconded an agreement to furnish consulting services for traffic engineering services and safety plan be signed with CH2M-Hill at a cost of not to exceed \$46,750. Motion carried.

Thompson also presented the contract, bond and certificate of insurance for St. Helens Paving Company for the Viewcrest Subdivision Street Improvements. Commissioner Ahlborn moved and Commissioner Minkoff seconded the contract be signed. Motion carried.

The following purchase orders were presented by Thompson, and approved: 2079-Pet Maticco, rock, \$1,581.50; 2078-Feenoughty, hopo repair, \$631.10; 2077-Feenoughty, gradeable rent, \$5,500; 2060-Commercial Enterprises, adapt base station for remote control, \$250; 2059-General Electric, remote control with hand remote, remote control with mike, \$540; 2071-Northwest Pump & Equipment, Tolhem commercial pump, \$1,210.80; 2070-McMillian Electronics, blue print machine, \$755.90.

Thompson stated that although three pickups had been ordered from state surplus, only one had been received, and he was going to check on the third one.

Thompson reported the bridge inspection has been completed, and he will be discussing the results with the foremen and inspectors on Thursday. He also plans to submit the weight limits on bridges on Hermo Road to PGE.

Thompson discussed the St. Helens Chamber of Commerce meeting on Tuesday which he and Commissioner Foshaug attended, regarding the railroad crossing at Deer Island Road at Highway 30. He indicated the railroad representatives were to forward information to the county as to who made original application for the crossing to determine whose responsibility maintenance would be.

Thompson then reported he had issued a waterline permit to Warren Water Association on the Oester Road, and indicated there might be some complaints about this.

Thompson reported a slide area on the Flora Road near Mist needs repair this summer. He also advised a logger is in the process of making preparations to use the road for a landing for log loading. After discussion, it was agreed to check with the District Attorney on what the county could do to prevent this.

Commissioner Ahlborn advised that he would need a grader at Wilkerson for one day and requested this be any day but Monday. Thompson agreed to mention this to Hank Luckner. Commissioner Ahlborn also discussed his need for a dump truck for summer months at Camp Wilkerson, and Thompson stated he had a five-yard truck available.

Thompson stated he had rented a tractor and trailer to Jim McBride for hauling asphalt for the city of Portland.

The board discussed with Thompson the access roads being constructed to Pittsburg road, and indicated the approaches are too steep. They requested he check into the matter.

Ron Reeves met with the board to submit recommendations of the Surface Mining Review Committee regarding applications for permits. Commissioner Ahlborn moved and Commissioner Minkoff seconded surface mining permits be issued to Shoreline Rock Products and Waters Concrete Products, Inc. Motion carried.

Reeves also indicated a replacement on the Planning Commission needed to be made, to replace Everett Skeans, and recommended the appointment of George Cowles of Rainier. Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded Cowles be appointed for the unexpired term ending January 1, 1976, subject to his acceptance. Motion carried.

An agreement between the City of Clatskanie and the State of Oregon was approved by the board, for the city of Clatskanie to receive allocation of BOR funding for park improvements.

After discussion the board agreed it would not hold a meeting on July 18, so the members could attend a forest service dedication ceremony at the Tillamook burn site.

Request for information concerning Tax Lot 273-15, county-owned property, was received from C.E. Hubbard. After discussion, it was concluded that a letter be written Hubbard advising that he could submit an offer to purchase this property if he desired.
