Under such procedures, the returns to growers may be considerable although less than for an intensively produced crop such as strawterries. Of course, production costs, especially labor, are much With a moderate climate, a long growing season, and high rainfall,

most of the area is well suited to the production of grasses and legumes but at the same time this production is apt to be poor as a result of low fertility levels resulting from excessive leaching over centuries. In addition, grass crops are deceiving in their yielding ability and many growers are satisfied to have a green cover that appears to be productive but the actual yields may be far from the potential of the plant

species to produce. Without the use of fertilizers and improved species, forage yields of one ton of dry matter per acre would probably be good. When improved management practices are adopted, including liming, fertilization according to soil tests to supply nitrogen, phosphorus, potash, sulfur, boron and magnesium, dry matter yields of forages can readily climb to five or six tons per acre annually, depending somewhat upon the soil involved. The use of irrigation can result in even

greater yields. Because the production of forages is tied almost entirely to the livestock and dairy industry, the value of the crop sometimes escapes the comprehension of the land owner. If instead of pounds of forage produced, the figures were given in pounds per acre of meat. the forage values and dollar returns might more readily be understood. Depending upon levels of animal management, figures of 400 to 500 pounds of meat per acre or more are within the field of reasonable
