

Arthur Lucre Services Read

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Funeral services for Arthur Lynn Lucre, 59, resident of Vernonia since 1959 were held Thursday, July 12, at 1:30 p.m. at the Vernonia Memorial Cemetery. The Rev. Dan Billings, pastor of the Assembly of God Church, officiated. Fuiten Mortuary Chapel was entrusted with the arrangements.

Arthur Lynn Lucre was born September 24, 1913 at Colville, Washington, the son of Archie and Lottie Singer Lucre. He moved with his family as a young boy to Tygh Valley, Oregon. He was raised in that area and attended schools in Maupin. After his schooling he went to work for the railroad. In 1930 he moved to Portland and worked for the Libby's cannery.

Mr. Lucre was united in marriage to Helen Hiersche June 29, 1940, in Portland. After their marriage he went to work as a truck driver. He had worked for Sherman-Clay, Allied Van Lines and Holman Transfer. He was forced to retire twelve years ago due to a back injury. Mr. Lucre was a member of the Teamsters Union Local No. 162, Portland.

Since coming to Vernonia in 1959 the family had lived at 1158 Columbia. For the past two years he has been under doctor's care for coronary artery disease. Mr. Lucre died Monday evening, July 9, at Providence Hospital in Portland.

He is survived by his wife Helen, of Vernonia; two sons and three daughters, Michael L. and Terri Lynn Lucre, both of Vernonia, James A. Lucre and Linda H. Lucre, both of Portland, and Mrs. Robert (Karen) Heisterman of Vernonia.

Two grandchildren, Heidi and Bobbie Ann Heisterman of Vernonia; a brother and three sisters, Milton Lucre of Cathlamet, Wash., Lovetta Severson, and Rae Smith, of Washington, D.C., and Mrs. Everett (Billie) Smith of Kent, Washington, also survive.

Lists Available For 'Big One'

Premium lists and entry forms are now available for all divisions of the Oregon State Fair, August 25-September 3, according to State Fair Manager Robert L. Stevens.

The lists are available by writing State Fair Entry Office, Salem, Oregon 97310. Stevens suggested prompt action, since Horse Show entries close Wednesday, July 18, and all other divisions close Wednesday, August 1.

Premium lists are available for the following divisions: Agriculture-Horticulture including bees and honey and county feature exhibits; All Oregon Art and Crafts Show; Floriculture; Home Economics; All America Horse Show; Livestock; International Photo Salon; Poultry, Pigeons, Rabbits and Cavies.

Entrants in 4-H receive their materials through their county agents and FFA members receive information through high school agriculture instructors.

Stevens issued a special invitation to entrants in Home Economics, pointing out the division includes competition in table decorating, clothing and textiles, and foods. Premiums include valuable merchandise prizes donated by industry, in addition to the cash premiums. Also noted is a new award this year, "Queen of Home Economics", open to both junior and senior exhibitors. The award is based on total points won in both Foods and Clothing and Textiles divisions with the winner to receive a sewing machine.

"East Meets West" is the theme of this year's fair with new and exciting international exhibits and features already confirmed, Stevens emphasized.

Campground Fees Due Hike for '74 Season

The State Transportation Commissioner has proposed an increase in state parks campground fees effective with the 1974 camping season.

As approved by the commission, campground fees in Oregon's state parks will be increased from \$1 to \$1.25 for unimproved tent sites, from \$2 to \$2.50 for improved campsites and from \$3 to \$4 for fully-equipped trailer sites.

The proposed fee increase is expected to raise about \$335,000 annually and will offset a chronic deficit in the state parks operation and maintenance budget. The deficit for the 1972-73 fiscal year was \$388,000.

The new campground fee schedule will also bring Oregon's camping fees in line with comparable fees in state parks in Washington and California.

West Oregon Granted Loan

Sen. Mark Hatfield called Thursday, July 12, to report that West Oregon Electric Co-op. will receive a \$210,000 loan from the Rural Electrification Administration.

He noted, as did a spokesman for West Oregon, that the loan is to help finance 16 miles of distribution lines to serve an additional 250 consumers, and to help finance system improvements.

Hatfield noted that the borrower proposes to obtain supplemental financing from the National Rural Utilities Co-op Finance Corporation.

Larry Kelly of Banks is president of the board of directors, and Guy Thomas the manager of the Vernonia-base utility.

Gasoline Tax Told by OMVD

Tax on nearly 106 million gallons of gasoline was collected by the Oregon Motor Vehicles Division for May, despite reported gasoline shortages in the state.

Chest W. Ott, Administrator of the Motor Vehicles Division, says the May gallonage figure represented an increase of slightly more than four percent over April this year and an increase of slightly less than four percent over the same month a year ago.

Although more gasoline was sold in May than in any other month in the state's history, Ott says the agency's reports received from motor vehicle fuel dealers reflected a change from a year ago.

Major dealers, such as ARCO, Exxon, Mobil, Shell, Standard, Texaco and Union, reported increases in gallons taxed, but a few independents showed sharp decreases when compared with May last year.

One independent, for example, paid 80 percent less tax this May than last May when gallonage dropped from 1.7 million gallons to 350,000. Another reported a drop of 75 percent when gallonage dropped from slightly more than two million to less than 500,000.
