

Legislature's Year 'Hectic'

It's been a hectic year for this session of the Oregon State Legislature with many firsts being recorded and some startlingand sometimes dismaying-actions being taken by that august body of senators and represen-

tatives. One first which will not be pleasant to record is Oregon's first billion dollar budget; another is the fact that it was the longest (180 days) session in

Oregon's history. There were several bitter confrontations over certain billsone of which was Governor Tom McCall's Tax Plan which was finally defeated by a vote of the people in a special election held May 5. This bit of legislative action led to the replacement of Senator Vern Cook and Columbia County representative Dick Magruder, as chairmen of their various committees under the guise of inefficiency in the handling of the manner when they balked at speeding the plan

through Another was the clash between Governor Tom McCall and Sen. Wm. Holmstrom, which ended with the death of eight fish bills in committee before they ever reached the floor, and in the defeat of a bill which would have united the Fish and Game Com-

mission under one agency. The only fish bill to squeak through that was favorable to the sportsmen vs. commercial clique, was a weakly watered down steelhead bill.

As inflation hit the economy throughout the nation, it also caused legislative costs to soar with the 1971-73 expenses for legislative administration being \$225,325 vs. the '73-75 costs of \$472,128, out it was small comfort when one item-police protection—was less with '71-73 costs of \$176,333 against '73-75 prices of \$58,358. Overall expenses were: 1971-73 - \$5,670,-364.09; 1973-75 - \$8,430,050.50.

The over-one-billion dollar general fund budget reflected a 45 percent increase over the previous legislative session when the 1973-75 showed a total of \$1,194,000,000 against the prior costs of 820 million.

And not only costs went up. There was also the matter of employees with the previous legislative assembly having 321 and this term's assembly show-ing 362; an addition of 59 em-

ployees. Even such mundane things as paper used by the legislature climbed with 150 tons used for the last session and this session a whopping 225 tons used, or, to break it down a bit more, last time around each legislator used 1.6 tons of paper while this year, they scribbled a lot more, using 2.5 tons or almost one ton more of paper to say no more than they did in the session before.
