Dear Parents:
Don't panic, but we in the Vernonia schools are in a crisis situation. Washington Grade School is without a heating system. The reason - Cleaver-Brooks Manufacturing Company in Lebanon, Pennsylvania, the manufacturer of the boiler, went on strike and the new boiler has not been completed or shipped. As of this date the strike has not been settled and we are facing a five to six week time interval for completion: shipping and installation after the strike is settled. Moran Oil Company, the installer, had removed the old boiler to prepare the site for the new one before word of the strike was received.

What do we do? We have school of course! How? By double shifting the high school building.

Basically the plan is to double shift the high school building, having the high school classes from 7:40 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and the elementary classes from 12:50 p.m. to 4:50 p.m. The high school, Washington and Lincoln students will operate on this basis. If bus schedules can be worked out Mist will operate on a normal schedule.

The principals are working out the details of scheduling, room assignments, etc. this week and we will have a plan of operation ready next week to present to you. The plan will include bus schedules, room assignments, class schedules, and other details. Please read the local paper, for details next Thursday.

We hope to have these details worked out early next week and then we will be prepared to answer your questions. The district office, 429-5891, and the offices at the high school, 429-3521, and Washington School, 429-7941, will be open and will to the best of our ability endeavor to answer your questions.

Services Read For Culbertson

Harry Culbertson, 75 years old retired blacksmith and a resident of the Vernonia area since 1925, died at the Forest Grove community hospital August 16. He had been hospitalized since suffering a fall off his home roof August 2.

Funeral services were held at the Fuiten Mortuary Chapel, Vernonia Tuesday August 21st at 1:30 p.m. The Rev. Russell Vinyard, pastor of the Vernonia Christian Church conducted the services with lodge rites under the auspices of Vernonia Lodge No. 184 AF and AM with interment following at the Vernonia Memorial Cemetery.

Mr. Culbertson was a native of Altuna, Kansas and then moved with his family to Oregon in 1900 when they settled at Baker. He received his education there and then attended the University of Oregon before serving in the armed forces during World War I. He married Isabel Crawford at Kelso, Washington on September 17, 1921 and they lived at LaGrande until moving to Vernonia in 1925.

Mr. Culbertson was the village blacksmith at Vernonia from 1925 until he retired in 1965. He was very active in fraternal affairs in the Vernonia area. He was a member and past master of Vernonia Lodge No. 184 AF and AM, a member of the Order of Eastern Star and the Royal Arch Masons; and member and Past Noble Grand of the Vernonia IOOF Lodge and a member and past post commander of the American Legion Post No. 119 and was a Past district commander of the American Legion. A few years ago he led a drive to rebuild the American Legion Hall.

Surviving is his wife, Mrs. Isabel Culbertson, Vernonia; three sons, Harry Culbertson Jr. Belchertown, Mass.; Robert of Portland and Douglas, Hollywood; two sisters, Lila Frederick, Rancho Cordova, California and Faye Christiansen, Haines, Oregon; six grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

Lodge rites at the services were conducted by Glenn Hawkins, with Ralph Sturdevant, Sam Hearing, George Johnson, Louis Johnston, and Bill Horn and Bert Brunson serving as pall bearers.

William Filter New Principal

Newly hired Scappoose Warren-Watts school principal William "Bill" Filter brings considerable background in the education field to the Scappoose School District.

The 33-year-old Filter, who currently lives in St. Helens comes from the Portland Community College staff where he has been working out of St. Helens in co-ordinating community education programs in St. Helens, Scappoose and Vernonia.

He was born in Eastern Washington, attended Seattle schools till Junior High, then moved to Yakima where he graduated from Yakima High School in 1958. He then attended the University of Washington, graduating in 1962 with a BA in Economics. In his first post college position, Filter taught in Alaska from 1962-64 for the Division of State Operated Schools, in Chignik, Alaska.

After one year out of the education field, when he worked as a store manager for Sears, he returned to Eastern Washington College to work on his Masters in Education, and then back to Alaska where he was on the staff of the University of Alaska, as audio-visual program director. During this period, 1967-69, he also assisted in a training program to place trained personnel in rural villages in Alaska as well as supervised teachers in Fairbanks for the University of Alaska.

From June of 1969 til mid 1971 he worked with Portland Northwest Regional Educational Library in developing new educational materials for schools. In 1971 he moved to Vernonia and lived there for about a year before he was accepted through the Mott Foundation to complete his Doctorate. He worked on his Doctorate at Wayne State University in Michigan and at the present time needs only the dissertation to complete his Doctorate.

In the fall of 1972 he went to work for PCC and was employed there until his hiring by the Scappoose School District. In anticipation of his new position in the Scappoose Schools, Filter offered this observation: "I would like to have parents feel they are welcome at our Scappoose schools and we certainly encourage parents to get to know their children's schools and become familiar with the educational job we are trying to do with their children."
