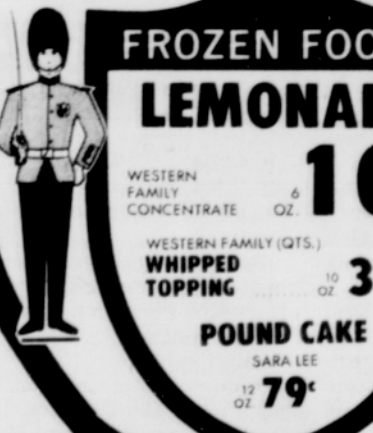

JULY MARKED an important anniversary for Robert (Bob) Curl of Vernonia. He celebrated 1,000,000 miles of cross-country driving without an accident. Curl, who has been driving for Mayflower the past 12 years, averages approximately 90,000 miles a year on the road.

One Million Miles Driven

Robert (Bob) Curl has not only driven a million miles but a million miles without an accident. He has covered all the 48 continental states and also Canada on his trips. Only once has he been forced to lay over for 48 hours because of snow. This was last Easter in Rawlins, Wyoming.

Curl started his truck driving while he was still in high school, hauling cattle from Paris, Illinois to Indianapolis, Indiana. He was born and grew up in Paris and graduated from Paris High School. He married Betty, a hometown girl, before moving to Vernonia in 1947 to help his uncle, Pete Brunsman in the hardware store, where he worked until '53. Schoolbuses was his next driving job, where he did four years.

Bob started driving for Mayflower in 1957, "because," he answered smiling, "things were slow around here; I always wanted to drive and Mayflower was always advertising for drivers so I gave them a try." After driving for three years he went into the grocery business which he worked at until '64 but he preferred driving so he returned to Mayflower where he has been ever since.

He averages 8 to 10 thousand miles a month this is about one and a half times across the states. Out of the 90,000 miles a year about a third is logged for Tektronix moving their displays for the electronics shows.

There is regular truckers stops where they have lounges where they can shower, clean up and just relax for a while. Curl averages 500 miles a day and can

go for nearly 1,000 miles before filling up the two fuel tanks. He stops and enjoys a ball game once in a while but for anything unusual there hasn't been much. He stops and helps people who may be in trouble and followed in the wake of a hurricane in Florida.

The traveling is a family affair with all the members, his wife Betty and nine children, Joe, Steve, Rich, Pat, Jeff, Doug, Debbie, Beckie and Gigi, going on trips with him during the year. Betty makes at least one trip a year and the boys take turns during the summer. Debbie took the first long trip when she was seven to Disneyland then flew home.

Bob and Betty left Tuesday for Danville, Ohio for ten days. When asked which place was the best he has seen he replied, "You can't beat Oregon, of course its home and I always feel this country is the greatest."

Oregon Shares In Payments
