Board of Commissioners

(Memorandum Minutes)

The Columbia County Board of Commissioners met in regular session September 5 with Chairman Fred Foshaug presiding. Commissioners Minkoff and Ahlborn, and secretary Gloria Salvey (deputy clerk) in attendance.

Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded the minutes of the meeting of August 29 be approved. Motion carried.

Miscellaneous claims were approved.

Keith Thompson, Roadmaster, and Sam Hollinger met with the board to review road department matters.

Don Parcher was present, and requested something be done about the bridge in Hudson Park. Hollinger was requested to check this, and make whatever repairs might be necessary.

Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded to approve Purchase Order 2304, Columbia Photo, for camera, case, and wide-angle lens, for \$231.95, and Purchase Order 2389, Traffic Safety Supply Co., signs, for \$1,821.50. Motion carried.

Thompson discussed problems encountered because of employee illnesses.

Thompson reported civil service exams will be held on September 14 for Road Maintenance Man 3 and 4 positions.

Thompson advised that he had received a reply from the Cabanas regarding an easement across their property, and they will contact him further.

Thompson indicated he had made arrangements with Mr. Widmeier regarding the Kater hill bus turnaround, and that it would probably take a week or two to complete the project.

A Deed of Dedication for Road Purposes, and a Storm Drainage Easement were received from Richard and Joan Wallin. Mr. Thompson recommended an Order be signed accepting the deed for road purposes as a public road rather than a county road, pending widening of the state highway. The instruments were referred to county counsel, Martin Sells, for preparation of the necessary papers.

Thompson advised he had forwarded an Easement to Mr. Havlik for signature, for the Ringering Road improvement.

When questioned about the schedule for the remainder of this month, Thompson advised they will be completing the patching on Timber Route; next week they will start seal coating in the Scappoose area and the Pittsburg-Vernonia Road; after that the Brinn Road bridge should be ready for construction, and then work on the airport road.

Thompson reported the Scappoose Drainage Districts wants to make some changes in the drainage canals, and put in a new pumping station, which would be done by the Corps of Engineers. He added they also would have to construct a new bridge across the canal, which they hoped would be financed by a bond issue.

Thompson indicated he had not yet prepared the specifications prepared.

After discussion, Hollinger was requested to make some telephone calls about various sanders to determine which brand is considered best, and whether parts were available, then report back as soon as possible.

At 10 a.m. the public hearing regarding the proposed vacation of a portion of the C.L. Cleveland Road recommenced. Present were Ron McDonald and Harold Bergerson. After considerable discussion about the differences in the legal description contained in the original notice, and the true roadway involved in the vacation request, John DeFrance, of the district attorney's office, recommended that a new legal description be prepared, and the vacation procedure be started anew. The Board concurred in this recommendation, and Thompson and DeFrance were to work together to prepare the new resolution for vacation of the portion of the road.

A letter was received from Sgt. R.T. Dresler, Traffic Safety Officer, St. Helens Police Department, regarding installation of "wrong way - do not enter" signs at the Courthouse parking lot. When questioned about this, Thompson indicated he had not been aware of the situation, and would order the necessary signs. Discussion ensued regarding

lack of completion of various projects started by Thompson. Hollinger requested that complaints about conditions of roads be referred directly to him, and he would see they were answered. The Board recommended to Thompson that more authority be delegated to Hollinger in answering of complaints, and making necessary repairs.

Hollinger questioned what was to be done about the condition of the various bridges in the county, and the Board requested him to make recommendations. Hollinger indicated there are insufficient men and supplies to do very much. After discussion, Hollinger was directed to start obtaining the necessary supplies and to start repairing the bridges, with top priority given to bridges school buses cross. He was also directed to start putting up the signs on the various bridges. Hollinger was instructed to use his own judgment in the types of material used for repairs. Thompson indicated the sign posts had not yet been ordered.

Based upon recommendation of the administrator, Surface Mining Land Reclamation Review Committee, Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded a surface mining permit requested by Kessi Brothers for a site on Gilmore Road be denied, and the

\$100 application fee refunded. Motion carried.

Mr. and Mrs. William Foster presented a deed for road purposes, which had been discussed previously. The deed was referred to Sells for preparation of the necessary order accepting.

After due consideration, Commissioner Ahlborn moved and Commissioner Minkoff seconded Mrs. Phyllis R. Busch, of Vernonia, be recommended to Governor McCall as a replacement for Dorothy Knowlton, as Justice of the Peace, Vernonia District No. 4. Motion carried.

Mrs. Lee Miller met with the Board to advise that new state regulations do not provide for the collection of donations at the immunization clinics, and requested authorization to discontinue the practice. The board concurred in her request.

Mrs. Miller also discussed painting of the examination table donated by Dr. George, and was advised this could probably be done by one of the prisoners. She requested some sort of locked cabinet be made for instruments and medication used in the venereal disease clinic. She was advised that surplus equipment was probably available, and that perhaps Dr. George could accompany Commissioner Minkoff to look for a cabinet. Mrs. Miller then requested authorization to have

the pad on the examination table recovered, which was approved.

Mayor Van Gorder of Rainier met with the board to inquire about the status of Rainier's request to have the north end of Sixth Street deeded to the city for the sewer treatment plant. He was advised this had been referred to the District Attorney and Rainier's attorney to work out.

Commissioner Ahlborn moved and Commissioner Minkoff seconded Foshaug be authorized to accept the proposal of Rose Heating Company, Inc. to change the existing steam operation to hot water, for a total sum of \$1,573. Motion carried.

Mrs. Pearl Becker met with the board regarding inquiry received about placement of a caboose at the Vernonia Museum, with pictures of Camp 8 to be contained therein. She was advised to answer the letter, and to point out the various safety factors involved in the placement of the caboose, and the damage which might be done to photographs if they were not protected from the weather and humidity.

District Attorney Robert Lucas met with the board to discuss the status of various items referred to his office. He also discussed CRAG rejection of law enforcement project applications submitted.

At the request of the board, Judge Kalberer met with them to discuss use of the county-owned vehicles by the Juvenile Department. He also discussed the provisions of the "rock festival ordinance" and suggested revisions should be made regarding the number of people governed in the ordinance.
