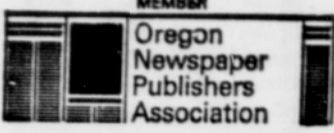

CZ Announces Two Transfers

Crown Zellerbach has announced two personnel transfers at the company's Stamm Managed Forest office near Vernonia and at the Columbia City sawmill.
At Stamm, David G. Knowlton, who has been at the CZ office there since 1956, has transferred to Seaside as industrial relations supervisor at the Clatsop Managed Forest.
Replacing Knowlton as controller at Vernonia is Charles W. Gebhardt, who has joined the company from Arthur Andersen & Company (CPA) in Portland.
George W. Gardner, personnel and safety supervisor at CZ's Columbia City sawmill since 1970, has been promoted to personnel and safety supervisor of the company's Park Lumber sawmill at Estacada.
Named to replace Gardner at Columbia City is George J. Nandor, recently retired from the U.S. Army as a Lt. Col.
Knowlton joined the company in 1949 at Cathlamet, Washington, after graduating from Oregon State University. In 1956 he moved to Vernonia, and in 1958 was appointed office manager at the Stamm office. He was promoted to controller in 1972.
Gebhardt, a CPA, received a BBA degree from the University of Portland in 1967 and an MBA degree from the University of Nevada in 1968. He is married with no children.
Nandor received a B.S. degree from the University of Maryland, an MA degree from Johns Hopkins University, and an MS degree in business administration from Boston University. He and Mrs. Nandor plan to move to Columbia City from their home in Tacoma, Washington.

Bessie Elanor Tucker was born October 9, 1895 at Prairie City, Oregon, the daughter of Benjamin and Bertha Cooley Parret. She was raised and attended schools in the Prairie City area.
She was united in marriage to Harry S. Tucker October 31, 1914, at Canyon City, Oregon. After their marriage they lived in Idaho for six years. In 1927 they returned to the Portland area living there until moving to Vernonia in 1947. Mr. Tucker preceded her in death in Vernonia in 1956. Drive Starts For Clean Up America Now

Clean Up America Month, September 15 through October 15, launches a nationwide campaign to beautify the nation for its 200th birthday in 1976, according to Secretary of the Interior Rogers C.B. Morton.
The month-long drive is one aspect of the Johnny Horizon '76 environmental awareness and action program sponsored by the U.S. Department of the Interior. Joining in the effort are nearly 2,000 co-sponsors and supporting organizations. Recognized as an official national Bicentennial activity, Johnny Horizon '76 appeals to all Americans to help prevent litter; minimize pollution; clean up the land, air and water; conserve energy; and use all natural resources wisely.
Johnny Horizon '76, symbolic outdoorsman, seeks to involve citizens in worthwhile environmental improvement efforts.
Clean Up America Month will be kicked off in Washington, D.C. at Constitution Hall with a Johnny Horizon '76 concert featuring "The New Seekers," the group that turned "I'd Like to Teach the World to Sing" into a million-copy seller. Other artists assisting in the cleanup campaign include Cicely Tyson, Tennessee Ernie Ford, Ted Mack, and Ferlin Husky, who will be featured in public service announcements. Burl Ives and other entertainers will present several environmental concerts during the month-long effort.

In Oregon, a women's club will place Johnny Horizon '76 displays in Portland banks. There will be a Johnny Horizon '76 exhibit at the Clackamas Community College "Environment 73" show September 16-18. As their part of nationally endorsed sponsorship of the Johnny Horizon program, Welcome Wagon hostesses will cooperate with Jaycees to distribute Johnny Horizon '76 litterbags in the Oregon City area.
Archie D. Craft, Oregon state director for the Bureau of Land Management, said that the Bureau's district offices will provide materials for local projects, including large Johnny Horizon-SOLV litterbags for use at hunter camps. He said, to join the Clean Up America Month campaign, contact any Bureau of Land Management office, or write to Johnny Horizon '76, P.O. Box 2965, Portland, OR 97208. Litterbags, a booklet "How to Conduct a Cleanup Campaign" and other information are available.
Of special interest to educators are Johnny Horizon '76 classroom kits with enough materials for average-sized classes. Included in the kits are pledge cards, bicycle stickers, posters, and ideas for class projects relating to environmental quality.

Fiction Class Scheduled For Cannon Beach

Weekend university credit classes in art, music and writing will be held in the M & M Building at Cannon Beach on the first weekend of October and November.
Writer Suzanne Blanc will conduct a class in fiction writing for new and continuing students emphasizing characters and structural development in novels and short stories. She will stress current market trends, preparation of manuscripts and the creative approach to revision.
Professor of music and conductor of the Lewis and Clark College choir, Dr. Stanley Glarum, has developed a workshop for school and choir directors to aid them in making choral conducting more effective. Literature, including contemporary settings with varying meter signatures will be covered as well as techniques for planning rehearsals.
A new and unique sculpture class Weatherworks: Sculpture for the Outdoor is planned by Cannon Beach artist, Thomas McColl, instructing students in the techniques of relief and free-standing sculpture constructed from found natural and man-made objects. Traditional and non-traditional uses of sculpture will be explored such as garden, fence or field sculpture; pond or floating sculpture.

Record Set For VA Dept.

The Department of Veterans' Affairs granted 1,272 farm and home loans in the amount of \$25,906,636 in August for the highest number and dollar amount on record, H.C. Saalfeld, director, reported today.
The highest number of loans previously was 1,079 in February, 1961, and the previous dollar volume record was \$18,356,932 last May.
The August figures compare with 928 loans for \$17,918,731 in July, and 786 loans in August last year for \$14,254,575.
August set a record for loan applications also, Saalfeld said, with 1,684 veterans applying against the former record set in July, 1,347. Applications in August last year totaled 942.
To meet the loan demand, the veterans' department sold \$75 million in farm and home loan bonds September 5 for a favorable interest rate of 4.6885 percent. U.S. National Bank of Oregon was the buyer. The price was well below the 4.8769 percent paid last January, and was the lowest rate since December, 1971, when bonds went for 4.5314 percent.
Veterans borrow the money at 5.9 percent.
