Col. Co. Rates Best Program

Four years ago, Oregon was the first state to officially have an Executive Ombudsman.

The Ombudsman provides an informal channel through which a citizen may obtain quick, impartial hearing on his complaints about bureaucratic abuse in government, without legal counsel or the expense of formal litigation.

As a member of the Governor's own staff the ombudsman is in a powerful position to act upon complaints concerning the problems individuals may have in dealing with the state and local governments.

Bob Oliver, the Ombudsman has just announced that the state will now have an Assistant Ombudsman for nursing homes who will be responsible for visiting nursing homes to determine whether there are valid complaints by reason of their infirmities.
