County Fair Huge Success Says CARC Rep

Speaking before the Columbia Association for Retarded Children and parents of the handicapped, Mrs. Sarolta Naby, Consultant for the Education Program for the Mentally Retarded, defined "behavior modification" as getting rid of the unacceptable behavior pattern and reshaping to structured training.

The basic principals of behavior modification includes cues, response and the use of a reinforcer. Cue is a verbal command or hand motion, "come here," "sit down." Response is child coming to teacher or sitting down. The reinforcer is either social praise, i.e. a smile, hug, pat, or good boy, good girl. primary reinforcer is food, candy, raisin, treat, etc. Generalized reinforcer consists of gold stars, tokens, money or some type of recreational treat for the older child such as bowling, skating, etc. reinforcement should be geared to child's mental age. Reward should follow immediately after behavior wished strengthened.

CARC President Angie Noelle chaired the September General Meeting which followed the annual pot luck and speaker's report. CARC members voted to accept the activity board's recommendation to hire a secretary for the Clatskanie Activity Center. The cost of her salary during the first six months to be shared with the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation. Members also voted to accept board's recommendation to sublease the house on Columbia Blvd. to be used as temporary quarters for the St. Helens Activity Center.

Marge Coalman reported the County Fair at Klegler Park a huge success. Plans are already underway to make it an annual event. A portion of the money will be donated to CARC and a percentage is earmarked for the building fund for the Lower Columbia Activity Center.

President Nolle appointed Mrs. Roseline Mallory to serve as CARC's U.G.N. Representative.

Mrs. Donna Thorp was elected to serve as chairman of the nominating committee; serving with her are Mrs. La Marr Meadows and Mrs. Rosie Goodwin.

Mrs. Dena Nelson, director of the Social Drop-In Center, sponsored by the County mental health department, was introduced and explained a little about the newly organized program. Mrs. Nelson needs help in fund raising and publicity. She suggested perhaps a guild might be formed for this purpose.

Mrs. Dixie Van Horn from the LUCK Group requested help in obtaining names and addresses of known handicapped people in the county for the purpose of making this information known to the fire departments throughout the County.

Mrs. Mary Strohecker, Scappoose high school Spedical Ed. teacher and advisor to the recently organized Youth ARC was present with three of her volunteer aides. The students, Sharon Bigger, Susan Ingraham, and Scappoose high YARC President Bill Collings attended to learn more about behavior modification. YARC membership requires five hours of orientation before one can become a member.

Communication Tops Marital Factor List

Communication is rated at the top of the list of factors contributing to marital satisfaction or dissatisfaction, says Carol A. Ashley, Extension home economist.

Communication is also an important factor in other family relationships. In many cases, she says, a generation gap might be called a communication gap.

Focus on Communications, an Extension Service program scheduled for October 9, will center on identifying barriers to communications and on ways to remove these barriers. The session will be held at the McBride School cafeteria beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Featured speaker will be Roberta Frasier Anderson, Extension family life specialist at Oregon State University. During the past 14 years in this position Mrs. Anderson has worked with families throughout Oregon. She served on the Governor's Committees on Children and Youth, Status of Women, and on the Community Coordinated Child Care Council. In 1972 she received the USDA superior service award for her work in family life.

There is no charge for the Focus on Communications session. The program is open to all families or individuals.
