


Communication is rated at the top of the list of factors contributing to marital satisfaction or dissatisfaction, says Carol A. Ashley, Extension home economist.

Communication is also an important factor in other family relationships. In many cases, she says, a generation gap might be called a communication gap. Focus on Communications, an Extension Service program scheduled for October 9, will center on identifying barriers to communications and on ways to remove these barriers. The session will be held at the McBride School cafetorium beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Featured speaker will be Roberta Frasier Anderson, Extension family life specialist at Oregon State University. During the past 14 years in this position Mrs. Anderson has worked with families throughout Oregon.
