



The Columbia Foster Parents Association will offer a series of hospital at that time were his wife and son George of Hillsboro four meetings on improving the special parenting skills needed by foster parents. The meetings will be held in the Children's Services Division office on Tuesday nights from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. A babysitting stipend will be paid to foster parents. Coffee and cookies will be served. The sessions will be October 23 and 30, November 6 and 13. The meetings are open to anyone interested in improving their parenting skills. Mr. Val Linn will be the discussion leader.

The October 23 session will concern "Relating to the Children's Services Division." Ways of forming a working partnership with each caseworker, using the agency's services, and similar ideas will be discussed.

The October 30 meeting will be about "Foster Parents' Expectations of themselves and their foster children." This will cover morals, acceptance, testing behavior and ways of reconciling expectations to a realistic workable level. On November 6, the session

will be to discuss "Crisis Situations." The definition of a genuine crisis, unacceptable behavior and out-of-control actions will be included in the discussion.

The final meeting on November 13, will be on "Helping to improve the self-image of foster children." Messages that effect the self-image, dealing with failures and inevitable validating skill and worth are topics that will be discussed.

Mr. Linn is a foster parent and a counselor for a private social agency. He has several years of experience working with troubled young people and has worked out some useable techniques to help these children realize their potential and deal with their problems.
