The camping season usually extends from May through October, but weather can cause a variation in closing dates. This is especially true in the high altitudes of Central and Eastern Oregon where cold weather can make an earlier closing date advisable.

There are seven overnight camps which remain open throughout the year, with six of them located along the Oregon Coast and the other in Southwestern Oregon 12 miles south of Grants Pass. These parks are Fort Stevens, Cape Lookout, Beverly Beach, Jessie M. Honeyman, Bullards Beach, Harris Beach and Valley of the

Rogue. As a rule, the State Parks are never closed to the public for day use but in high altitudes snow and freezing weather may close access to some areas or require draining water systems and

**Greatest Need For Seniors** 

Needs are being identified and priorities are being established for the Senior Citizens of Columbia County according to Robert Hunt, Chairman of the Task Force on Aging for Columbia

Hunt along with various subcommittees and representatives of the Clackamas-Columbia-Washington Counties' Agency on Aging have tentatively identified transportation as the single greatest need for Senior Citizens

within the County. 'Without adequate transportation, senior citizens are unable to avail themselves to the other services that are available or may be needed within the coun-

ty," Hunt said. The Task Force was formed to research and identify needs of the Senior Citizens along with determining what resources presently exist and what resources for the elderly may be needed. According to Hunt it is important that all available local resources are utilized before establishing new resources.

"It is equally important that existing resources realize that Senior Citizens have needs and problems that are just as realistic as other residents of the county," Hunt said.

"Senior Citizens are the most neglected and forgotten group in the nation today," Hunt said. He went on to explain that the Senior Citizens of today were the active and contributing taxpayers of yesterday who cannot be ignored by the active citizens of

"Local officials have an obligation to recognize not only the contributions the Senior Citizens have made to the county but to assure the Senior Citizens that the County has not forgotten them," Hunt said.

In addition to the transportation committee headed by Dorothy Churchill, other committee chairmen include: Norm Barmier, Employment, Manpower and Income; Amanda J. Kammer, Alternatives to Institutionalization and Legal Aid; Doris Diman, Retirement Roles and Activities: Bob Stevens, Health and Nutrition; and Nick Federici, Housing. 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
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
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
