

DEQ To Be Restructured O'Scannlain Announces

Environmental Quality Director Diarmuid O'Scannlain announced a restructuring designed to bring DEQ decisions closer to the community re-

cently. The proposed plan will be presented to the Environmental Quality Commission for approval at its October 22 meeting.

Five Regional Offices will handle permit recommendations and plan review at the regional level - "where the problems are," O'Scannlain explained.

The new organization completes restructuring started in August when formation of the Northwest Region was announced

The Northwest Region, under Administrator E.J. Weathersbee will cover State Administrative Districts one through three, extending as far south as Salem. The regional office will be in Portland, on premises previously occupied by Columbia-Willamette Air Pollution Authority.

The Mid-Willamette Region of DEQ, located in Eugene, will cover Administrative Districts four and five (Linn, Benton, Lincoln and Lane counties) and will be under the administration of Verner Adkison who will also continue as Director of the Lane Regional Air Pollution Authority under an agreement approved in principle by LRAPA's Board of Directors. O'Scannlain noted that Adkison's dual role would mean greatly strengthened cooperation between DEQ and the Regional Air Program. DEQ and LRAPA staffs will meet soon to work out details for

approval at LRAPA's next Board meeting Other regions will be the Southwest located in Roseburg and comprising Administrative Districts six through eight, from Roseburg South; the Central Region, headquartered in Bend, Districts nine through eleven; and the Eastern Region, headquartered in Pendleton, Dis-

tricts twelve through fourteen.
