Building Permits Down In August '73

Building permits down in Columbia County in August 1973, compared to August 1972, the University of Oregon Bureau of Business and Economic Research has reported.

In August 1973, the total was \$278,517 compared to \$391,686 in the same month last year.

Building permits from 147 identical reporting centers in Oregon totalled \$64,639,903 in August 1973. This was 10.6 percent lower than in August

The state total in August 1973, included \$32,663,503 for 1,788 new dwelling units: \$17,634,733 for new nonresidential construc-tion; and \$14,341,627 for additions, alterations, and repairs to existing structures.

For the same month last year the \$72,298,184 total of permits was composed of \$45,669,524 for 2,801 new dwelling units; \$15,879,906 for new nonresidential construction; and \$10,748,754 for additions, alterations, and repairs to existing structures.






