Hearing Set For Angling Regulations

Anglers should circle November 3 on their calendars. This is the date of a public hearing to consider recommendations of the Game Commission staff and of the public for the 1974 angling regulations.

The hearing will begin at 10 a.m. at the Western Forestry Center in the Zoo-OMSI area of Portland. Regulations will be set following the hearing.

The angling regulations booklet will be published in a new format this year, intended to make the rules easier to read and understand. Regulations will be divided into four major sections: miscellaneous rules, steelhead and salmon, miscellaneous game fish, and trout. The customary angling zones will be retained. Salmon and steelhead consist of fish of these species over 20 inches in length. Those under 20 inches are regulated as trout, except in the Pacific Ocean.

Suggested opening date for lakes and streams throughout the state is April 27 except streams in Zone 1 and portions of Zones 3 and 4 and a few other exceptions. This is a major change for the high lakes. Streams in Zone 1 and portions of the Rogue and Umpqua rivers would open on May 25 if staff suggestions are adopted. East and Paulina Lakes in Zone 5 and Clear Lake in Zone 2 would open May 25 along with the coastal streams. A section that applied to lakes, reservoirs, and their tributaries within national forest boundaries in previous years will be deleted.

Another suggested change would remove the minimum size limit from brook trout in Zones 7 and 9 (northeast Oregon). Biologists say brook trout grow slowly in this region and small ones should be caught to prevent overcrowding and stunting.

Season and bag limits for winter steelhead and salmon angling would remain essentially the same as last year with a few exceptions. The winter bag limit for trout in zone 1 and 2 streams would be two fish per day over 12 inches. However, the staff recommends that this year this limit be allowed in addition to the daily steelhead and salmon bag limit.

Another recommendation would extend the single hook regulation above Gold Ray Dam on the Rogue River to August 14 in order to protect salmon from snagging.

For the benefit of striped bass anglers, the use of fish for bait on the Umpqua River would be extended to Elk Creek.

The closures at the mouths of several coastal rivers in Zone 1 would be removed. The salmon season on the Chetco, Sixes, and Elk rivers in Curry County would be extended an additional month through December 31 to allow angling for late-run salmon.

State Game Director John McKean advises that in addition to staff proposals the Commission will also carefully consider all recommendations from sportsmen's groups and interested individuals. Some suggestions have already been received and more are expected prior to the November 3 hearing.

4-H'ers Meet November 3

Nine to twelve-year olds are at a teachable moment in developing understanding of children, points out Carol A. Ashley, Columbia County Extension Agent. Parents who want to take advantage of this readiness should investigate the 4-H Fun With Children project, she says.

Goals of the project are for members to gain an understanding of young children, to learn skills which can be applied later in life, and to learn that working with preschoolers can be fun. Members receive direction from adult leaders.

In the Fun With Children project 9 to 12-year old youths select pre-school children to be their "fun friends." They choose one or more types of activities in which to work with the children: stories and make-believe, art and music, toys and play, and nature and animal activities. Project materials for leaders and members offer suggestions for activities in each of these areas.

The project offers beginning training which can be applied later as babysitters and eventually as parents, Mrs. Ashley feels.

Additional details will be available at the Area 4-H Kick Off Conference on Saturday, November 3. Separate sessions are scheduled for child development and 29 other projects. The program will also include other ideas for 4-H activities and for working with 4-H club members.

The conference will be held at the Portland Community College from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Anyone interested in learning more about the child development project or other 4-H activities is invited.

Joining this year in supporting 4-H are Reader's Digest, sponsor of the 4-H leadership program; Kentucky Fried Chicken, donor of the 4-H poultry program, and Ski-Doo, Division of Bombardier Limited, sponsor of the North American 4-H Snowmobile Program, the first 4-H program offered jointly in both the U.S. and Canada.

Expo '74 World Fair Slated May To Nov.

Agriculture plans to tell an environmental story at the Expo '74 World's Fair here next year, May 4 to November 3.

Key to the show will be a 12-15 minute film flashed on a 120-degree wrap-around screen in a 5,000 square foot pavilion.

The film will show how the agricultural industry is improving nutritive value of food, improving land management, improving use of chemicals and generally trying to meet the growing world demand for food.
