Sharars Enjoy Mushroom **Hunt Locally**

A fairly rare mushroom, for this area, was found recently be Jerry Sharar. The Cauliflower Mushroom (Sparassis Radicata), identified with the coral family, was found in the Clatskanie area

The Cauliflower mushroom is fleshy with flat leafy branches of a lettuce-like appearance with height from three-to 12-inches and from four-to-24-inches in width. It is off-white, buff or pale yellow and huge rosette, round and much folded.

It is found in the woodlands of Oregon and Washington, mostly in the Olympic and Rainier National forests in Washington, and grows from spring till fall. 'It is edible and quite delicious. It keeps well and dries nicely" said Sharar.






