

## Two From Vernonia Now On Small Engine Group Meets

The Indians from Clatsop Community College are practicing daily on their home court at the Astoria Armory, preparing their defense and offense for the coming 1973-74 season.

Coached by Lehman Hall, the Indians are looking ahead to a 23-game season which begins December 4, when the Indians meet Pacific JV's on the Armory home floor.

Three ex-Warrenton high school basketballers are expected to see action this year. Darcy Bjork, a 6 foot 2 inch 185 pound freshman; Dennis Bjork, a 6 foot three inches, 178 pound sophomore; and 5 foot nine inches, 150 pound freshman Mike Curnow, all lettered for three years at Warrenton high. Darcy Bjork was All-Northwest League for three years. Dennis Bjork was named to the All-Northwest League and Curnow was on the second team of the All-Northwest League.

Vernonia contributed two players to the Indian roster. Rick Davis, a 5 foot 8 inch, 160 pound frosh lettered for three years, was All-League during his senior year and went to the state tournament in 1972. Bob Harmeyer, 6 foot 1 1/2 inches, 175 pound frosh lettered and also appeared in the 1972 state tournament.

Rick Pass, a 6 foot 4 inches, 200 pound frosh, and Ron Reynolds, a 6 foot 2 inch 185 pound sophomore, are both from Knappa. Pass lettered and was on the second place team in the 1970 state AA tournament, on the first place team in the 1971 state A tournament and was second team, all-state.

Jewell has contributed two players, Dave Twombly and Steve Olstedt. Twombly lettered four years and was on the second team, All-Northwest League Class A, 1972. Olstedt lettered at Jewell and was named All-Northwest League Class A. Twombly is a 5 foot 11 inch, 170 pound soph, and Olstedt is a 6

foot 2 inch 200 pound soph. Steve Schmitz from Astoria is also on the Indians team. He is a 5 foot 6 inch, 135 pound freshman.

Two basketballers from West Linn will be seeing this season with the Indians. Dan Croy, a 6 foot 1 1/2 inch 175 pounder, lettered two years at West Linn and was named to the second All-Wilco team and third in the AAA state tourney. Kim Kreilaus, a 6 foot 4 inch, 200 pound sophomore was on the Indian team last year. He placed on the second team of the All-Wilco league, and was named to the 1972 State AAA tourney.

Perry Flury, a 5 foot 11 inch, 170 pound freshman, is from Hood River Valley. The last member of the Indian team, Esua Faaititi, is a graduate of Fagaitue High School in American Samoa where he lettered for two years. He is a 5 foot 11 inch, 160 pound freshman.

## Coast Guard Says "Tell Us"

"If you don't tell us about it, we can't do anything about it." That's what Coast Guard officials are telling local residents about water pollution.

The Coast Guard is the agency charged with enforcing federal water quality regulations and for ensuring that clean-up of an oil spill is conducted. However, the Coast Guard reports that in many cases, their biggest problem is not being alerted to the existence of a spill.

In one recent week two spills amounting to more than 300 gallons of oil were reported to the Coast Guard in Seattle. Investigation disclosed that some local residents had observed the pollution as early as 24 hours before it was reported.

Rear Admiral Chester A. Richmond, Commander of the 13th Coast Guard District, reminds Washington and Oregon residents that, "In order to keep the waters of our states clean and free of the devastating effects of pollution, we must strive to eliminate all oil spills and when a spill is sighted, it must be reported immediately for clean-up to be effective."

The Admiral urged all residents sighting an incidence of pollution to report it as soon as possible to the nearest Coast Guard unit.

## Mail Early For Christmas

Postmaster Thomas Tomlin reminds patrons that it is time to start Christmas mailing if letters and parcels are to be received before December 25. Schedules for mailing are as follows:

Domestic mails: surface mail in all continental 48 states, letters, December 15; parcels, December 10; Airmail, December 21. In Alaska and Hawaii the schedule is December 15 for letters and November 30 for parcels by surface mail. By airmail it is December 20 for both.

International mail to Canada and Mexico should go out by December 19 for air greeting cards; December 14 for air parcels, December 7, surface greeting cards, and December 1 for surface parcels. In South and Central America mail air greetings by December 16, air parcels, December 11, surface greetings, November 17 and surface parcels, November 10. Mail to European countries is as South and Central America.

Mail to Africa and the Near East is: air greetings, December 14, air parcel, December 8, surface greeting, November 4, and surface parcel November 1. To the Far East, mail should be sent by December 14 for air greetings, December 8, air parcels, October 25, surface greetings and October 15, surface parcels.

Overseas military mail may be sent by one of four ways: airmail, parcel airlift (PAL); surface mail or space available (SAM). Dates for these are as follows:

In the Azores, Canada, Arctic which includes Greenland, Labrador, and Newfoundland, dates for airmail are December 8, PAL, November 30; surface mail, November 24 and SAM, November 24.

South and Central America is airmail, December 1; PAL, November 17; surface mail, November 10 and SAM, November 10. Europe - including Belgium, Denmark, England, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Italy, Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, and Spain - dates are December 11 for airmail; November 27, PAL; November 10, surface mail; November 20, SAM.

Africa - excluding Ethiopia - Congo and Liberia dates are December 8 for airmail; November 17, PAL; November 10, surface mail and November 10, SAM. Near East dates - Ethiopia, Iran, Israel, Saudi Arabia and Turkey are airmail, December 1; PAL, November 7; surface mail, November 1 and November 1 for PAL. Far East - Antarctica, Australia, Burma, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, New Zealand, Okinawa, Philippines, Taiwan, Thailand, and Vietnam, airmail dates are December 1; PAL, November 27; surface mail, October 27; and SAM, November 20.
