

Military Retirees Have Optional Plan

Prospective military retirees with dependents on the date of retirement are automatically covered by the SBP at the maximum benefit level unless the member submits a written election not earlier than 60 days nor later than one day prior to his retirement, electing not to participate or to participate in one of the optional coverages available.

Those who retired prior to September 21, 1972 have until March 21, 1974 to make their election to participate in the SBP. Questions relative to the Survivor Benefit Plan or any other problems from retired personnel may be referred to the Chief, Retired Affairs Branch (G-PS-8 61), Commandant, U.S. Coast Guard, Washington D.C.






