Fifty Years Ago - 1923

Forty Years Ago - 1933
Amy Hughes saw the University of Oregon-Oregon State College game, remaining overnight in Portland.

Noble Dunlap was elected master of the Natal Grange with Louis Carmichael chosen as overseer.

The tax levy of \$15,470.84 asked for in the proposed city budget was approved by vote of 82 to 61.

Thirty Years Ago - 1943
Vernonia schools were closed one afternoon as were most businesses in respect to Judge J.B. Wilkerson, at his passing.

Mrs. Dorothy Sandon reported that the collection of gifts for hospitalized servicemen were coming in fine.

The war department has never controlled the sale of penicillin, stated Surgeon General Norman Kirk, in answer to a civilian request for the new drug which prevents growth of infectious bacteria. The general went on to say that anyone wishing the drug should make their request through their civilian doctor.

Twenty Years Ago - 1953
