Retirement Complex Planned For Columbia County Area

Several years ago, Campbell became concerned about the growing number of "over 65" individuals that had no place to retire with dignity. Circumstances precluded their being alone and they were not in need of nursing home care. To put his dream into action he constructed an apartment building of studio and one bedroom unitys, each with a snack area. Included in the structure was a large cheerful dining room where buffet meals would be served. Then as the concept developed an area for hobby and crafts was added and a recreation area for pool, cards, etc, and a beauty-barber shop. Residents were given in addition to three buffet meals each day, weekly maid service and linens are furnished and

laundered. But Campbell knew that his had to be more than just another building. He stressed that great care should be taken in securing the services of resident managers. These managers had to have both compassion and consideration for the residents. The philosophy being that when a resident selects a retirement apartment he is really selecting a manager who can give this. Each apartment is connected to the Manager's office with an intercom so that any emergency can be dealt with immediately Because there are no govern-

mental or denominationl involvement, age restrictions, mandatory buy-in clauses, and long term leases were not imposed. Campbell feels that toremost the resident must be happy, if he isn't, he is free to

move. Emphasis is placed on com munity involvement and churches, civic and service organizations are urged to have meetings and programs at the facility and get acquainted with the residents. youth groups such as Camp Fire Girls and Girl Scouts are encouraged to adopt a CAMLU and do something special at Holiday times.

Introducing a new concept or way of life to a community is a slow process and people do resist having their life changed. What is gratifying is that the residents soon come to call Camlu home. They feel free to have relatives visit and dine with them. A guest room is maintained for the resident's guests.

And all of this is the result of just one man, Carl Campbell feeling there had to be something better for the Senior Citi-

Registration continues during the first week of classes Jan. 7 to


Special students at the university range in age from high school students taking courses by special arrangement to professional businessmen and women to grandmothers returning for more education.
