AFL-CIO Sets Scholarship Awards Date

College scholarship awards totalling \$3900 will be awarded to four seniors in high schools in Oregon in May this year by the Oregon AFL-CIO, Dean Killion, president announced today.

All high schools in the state have received notification of the contest and have been provided posters which contain contest details

The four students who score highest in an examination concerning labor and industrial history and the part that organized labor plays in American industrial society will be interviewed by a professional panel of persons not connected with the AFL-CIO.

The panel members will determine the order of the awards with first place winner to receive \$2400 scholarship payable at \$600 per year for the four years of undergraduate study. Three other students will receive \$500

The qualifying examination will be given to interested students in any high school in the state where the principal or teacher of social studies has notified the Oregon AFL-CIO by March 24 of the number of students who wish to take the test which is concerned with labor, management and governmental issues. Funds for the scholarships are provided by voluntary donations of unions throughout Oregon.

The panel will interview the finalists early in May Winners may use th

to attend any college or university in the United States or any public community college in

The state labor body has conducted the contest since 1947.

U of O Invites **Parents Visit**

Prospective University Oregon students and their parents are invited to learn about UO programs during U of O Preview, February 9

The Preview features a general session with an overview of the University, two morning sessions about available academic choices, and afternoon sessions on other concerns such as admissions and financial aid, career planning and placement, housing, and extracurricular activities.

Vernon Barkhurst, director of UO Admissions, notes that participants in this year's Preview are being encouraged to use buses and car pools due to the present gas shortage.

Oregonians Vie In Race

The Permatex 200 to be run in Riverside, California next Saturday may be along ways away for local residents but for two Oregon residents and auto rac-

ing fans it means a lot. For Hershel McGriff, of Bridal Veil, Oregon and Bud Fitzgerald of Scappoose, a lot rides on the outcome of the Saturday 200 miler. McGriff, driving a car tuned and crewed by Fitzgerald, set a new track record in qualifying for the Saturday race. Driving the famous Oly special with a motor build by Bor-A-Car of Portland, McGriff beat the existing track record by over two seconds in qualifying for the pole position.

Runnerup in qualifying was Bobby Allison, who earned the outside position with a qualifying time of 129.05 compared to McGriff's top time of 126.75.

Home Heating Costs Can Be **Cut If Wise**

Cutting the costs of home heating has always been a good idea simply because of the money-saving factor, but with all forms of energy now in tighter supply there are additional good reasons to make wise use of the heating system.

An eleven-point program outlined by Len Gassner, Executive Director, Oil Heat Institute of Oregon, will accomplish such savings without discomfort to the homeowner

He suggests that: 1. The thermostat should be turned down during the day if no

one is home. When retiring at night set the thermostat about seven degrees below the comfortable daytime setting. Setting it much below this point will make the furnace work that much harder in the morning to bring the temperature to the desired level. 3. If you open bedroom windows at night, be sure to close the bedroom door to avoid chilling

the entire house 4. If the home has an attic, be certain that it is closed off. Heated air rises and will be wasted in this little-used space if not shut off.

5. Radiators or registers in unused rooms should be shut off or closed and the door should remain shut.

6. Ask your dealer to check your heating system at least once a year. Often a minor adjustment or replacement of a faulty part will produce excellent savings.

Be sure that your water faucets do not leak or drip. Continual dripping of hot water will cause the heater to operate unnecessarily

8. You will save considerable amounts of hot water by first turning on the cold water and then slowly opening the hot water faucet until the desired temperature is reached.

9. Furnace filters should be replaced at least once a year to prevent reduction of heated air delivered to the room. 10. Do not permit rugs, dra-

peries, or furniture to block the flow of heat from radiators, convectors or diffusers. 11. Storm doors and windows

as well as good weatherstripping at doors and windows will help prevent heat loss

Road Deaths Decrease

Traffic deaths in 21 of Oregon's 36 counties decreased during 1973, according to the Oregon Motor Vehicles Division

Wheeler county in north-central Oregon, recorded no traffic deaths for the fourth straight year. Wallowa county also recorded no traffic deaths for the year while Crook, Hood River and Polk counties recorded drops of 50 percent or more in the number of people killed in

highway accidents. On the other side of the coin, Klamath county recorded 32 deaths, an all-time record. Nine other counties also recorded increases in traffic deaths. Of those counties. Tillamook showed the biggest jump, from nine to 19. Clatsop, Douglas, Gilliam, Grant, Jefferson, Morrow, Umatilla and Union counties also recorded increases in motor vehicle fatalities. Over half of Clatsop county's increase came in May when five people were killed in one crash.

The tri-county, metropolitan Portland area recorded a 26 percent reduction in traffic deaths, with Multnomah county leading the way with a 35 percent

The 1974 edition of "Your Federal Income Tax" is now available at Internal Revenue Service offices in Portland, Eugene, Medford and Salem and also in most post offices, it was

announced recently.
Ralph B. Short, IRS District Director for Oregon, said the perennial best-seller contains detailed tax information on such items as interest and dividends, rental income, sales and dispositions of assets, standard vs. itemized deductions, and adjustments to income, including moving expenses, sick pay, and employees' business expenses.

The 192-page booklet also summarizes important changes in the tax law and alerts taxpayers to the effect of the changes on their own situations.

"For those taxpayers who have special situations or who want more comprehensive information on specific tax circumstances, there is a convenient order blank in the back of the book for additional tax forms and publications," Short said.
