Up For Traffic

Increased traffic law enforce ment also resulted in an 11 percent increase in the number of Oregonians whose licenses to drive were suspended in 1973.

A total of 55,501 drivers had their licenses suspended at some time during the year. Another 345 licenses were cancelled and

More than 13,000 convictions for driving under the influence of alcohol were reported, an increase of 21 percent over 1972. Convictions for a second or subsequent charge of driving under the influence were up 21 percent. Convictions for driving with a blood alcohol level of .15 or more, an offense that results in a stiffer penalty than under the influence charge, totaled 2.790—a decrease of 415 percent when compared with 1972. DMV also initiated more than 10,000 suspensions under the state's financial responsibility

Discretionary suspensions made at the recommendation of a judge, or following evaluation of a driver's record by DMVjumped 41 percent during the year. Suspensions based on a poor driving record climbed to 3,046, a 37 percent increase over 1972. While court-recommended suspensions following conviction for a moving violation dropped 26 percent, recommendations for suspensions from courts following either failure to appear at a hearing or failure to pay a fine were up 37 percent.


