## Convictions Up For Traffic Violations

Convictions for violating traffic laws topped the 400,000 mark for the first time in Oregon last year, with a total of 421,822 reported to the Motor Vehicles Division. The figure is 14 percent above 1972.

Increased traffic law enforcement also resulted in an 11 percent increase in the number of Oregonians whose licenses to drive were suspended in 1973.

A total of 55,501 drivers had their licenses suspended at some time during the year. Another 345 licenses were cancelled and 20 revoked.

More than 13,000 convictions for driving under the influence of alcohol were reported, an increase of 21 percent over 1972. Convictions for a second or subsequent charge of driving under the influence were up 21 percent. Convictions for driving with a blood alcohol level of .15 or more, an offense that results in a stiffer penalty than under the influence charge, totaled 2,790—a decrease of 4 1/2 percent when compared with 1972.

DMV also initiated more than 10,000 suspensions under the state's financial responsibility law. Discretionary suspensions made at the recommendation of a judge, or following evaluation of a driver's record by DMV—jumped 41 percent during the year. Suspensions based on a poor driving record climbed to 3,046, a 37 percent increase over 1972. While court-recommended suspensions following conviction for a moving violation dropped 26 percent, recommendations for suspensions from courts following either failure to appear at a hearing or failure to pay a fine were up 37 percent.

### Cold Weather Could Hamper Boat Horns

The Coast Guard warns boaters that cold weather may hamper the operation of freon horns.

Federal law requires an efficient whistle or other sound producing device and specifies the minimum duration and audible distance of such devices. A boat operator could be found liable for a collision if it can be shown that a malfunctioning horn was responsible for the accident.

## Opening Hunt Dates Slated

The Oregon Wildlife Commission adopted Friday, January 11, the opening dates for the 1974 deer, elk, antelope, partridge, pheasant, and early archery deer seasons. The dates were set following a public hearing in the Commission's Portland office.

The general deer season for both mule deer and blacktail deer will be open on October 5. As has been the custom in past years, chukar and Hungarian partridge season will open concurrently with the deer season.

October 26 was selected for the opening of the Rocky Mountain elk season and Roosevelt elk season will open on November 16.

The opening date for the 1974 antelope season will be August 17. Pheasants will become legal game on October 19, and the early archery deer seasons were set to begin on August 24.

## OMSI Class Set By PCC

To observe the beginnings of life is a marvelous experience seldom encountered in the normal course of a child's education, but children in grades one through eight will be offered such an opportunity this February.

Using the facilities of Portland Community College, OMSI will present "Life and Organisms", an exciting five-week course giving children a close look at birth and emergence in both plant and animal kingdoms. They will use microscopes and hand lenses to examine egg sacs, rafts, buds, and cocoons, and will be led to a new understanding of these fascinating links in the chain of life.

Beginning February 2, classes will meet on Saturdays from 9 to 11 a.m. in room C5 of the Science Technology building at PCC's Sylvania center. Tuition is \$8.00 and the deadline for registration is Saturday, January 26.
