Board of Commissioners

(Memorandum Minutes)

The Columbia County Board of Commissioners met in regular session with Chairman Fred Foshaug presiding. Commissioners Minkoff and Ahlborn, and secretary Gloria Salvey (deputy clerk) present.

Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded the minutes of the meeting of January 30 be approved. Motion carried.

Miscellaneous claims were approved.

Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded to approve the following purchase orders: 2955-Walters Concrete Products, for rock, \$1,346.25; 2956-Scappoose Sand & Gravel, for rock, \$2,124.91; 2957-Olson and Johnson Shell, for diesel, \$676.70; 2960-Les Brady, Coal Creek Road fill, \$12,167. Motion carried.

Dan Koch met with the board to discuss repairs of the Scappoose-Vernonia road, and questioned bidding procedure on the project.

The second reading and public hearing on Reward Ordinance

No. 201 was held. There being no remonstrances Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded to adopt Reward Ordinance No. 201, containing an emergency clause, to become effective February 6, 1974. Motion carried with voting of three "ayes" and no "no" votes.

The first reading and public hearing on Ordinance No. 202 prohibiting logging operations on public rights of way was held. The second reading and public hearing on the proposed Ordinance will be held on February 20, 1974.

Dan Cannon, Columbia Area Manpower Council, met with the board to discuss signing of a proposed agreement with regard to planning for area jobs needs within the Multnomah, Clackamas, Washington, Columbia County regions. After discussion of the proposed contract, the board advised Cannon that it had no intent to enter into such an agreement until it had been further clarified as to what Columbia County's costs would be, and what the county would receive from entering into such an agreement.

Mrs. Amanda Kammer met with the board to discuss a questionnaire to be distributed throughout the county to determine the number of handicapped people what the handicaps are, invalid persons in them for rescue purposes in case of fire.

purposes in case of fire. Terry Rahe met with the board to discuss a possible extension of time for removal of solid waste from the property of Sue Murphy. He indicated he had received this request from a person who plans to remove the car bodies, but felt there was insufficient time to get this accomplished by February 11. Rahe was advised that the person could proceed with removal and that it would be checked on February 11 to determine his progress. At that time a decision would be made as to extension of time allowed.

Jeri Johnson met with the board to discuss whether it might not be advisable to have some type of assurance of insurance coverage for those employees using their own vehicles on county business, and being paid mileage for such use.

Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded an agreement be signed with Oregon Audio Video Systems Co. Inc. for installation of the closed circuit TV system in the jail. Motion carried.

Sitting as the Dog Control Board, a claim for livestock damage for \$80 was approved for Mrs. David A. Thompson, for a calf killed by dogs.

Commissioner Foshaug presented a recommendation of the St. Helens Rural Fire Department with regard to conducting fire drills in the courthouse. After discussion, it was agreed

this should be referred to the Safety Committee with a request that all department heads attend the next safety committee meeting to be instructed about the procedures to be followed.

With regard to fire department recommendations, Commissioner Ahlborn indicated it would not be feasible to plan to paint the fire escape from the old courthouse building until the weather is more stable than at present. Discussion ensued regarding the painting of the wood trim on the old courthouse building. It was agreed to discuss this with the painters now doing the interior of the new portion.

Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded to enter into an Agreement with Western-Communications, Inc. to construct and maintain structure and antenna for radio communication station site at their location near Pisgah Home. Motion carried.

Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded a Resolution be signed in the matter of requesting federal assistance for restoring the channel and protecting the bank of Scappoose Creek, near Highway 30. Motion carried.

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Census Will Take Survey

The Bureau of the Census will conduct its regular monthly survey in this area on employment and unemployment during the week of February 18-22, according to John E. Tharaldson, Director of the Bureau's Data Collection Center in Philadelphia. The Bureau is part of the U.S. Department of Commerce's Social and Economic Statistics Administration.

Local households in the survey are among the 50,000 nationwide that have been scientifically selected to represent a cross section of all households.

The survey is taken by the Bureau for the U.S. Department of Labor, which analyzes and publishes the results each month. The Labor Department reported that the December survey showed a rise in unemployment—up to 4.9 percent from 4.7 percent in November, after reaching a 3-1/2-year low of 4.5 percent in October. Employment was little changed, following substantial gains earlier in 1973.

Information supplied by individuals participating in the survey is confidential by law and results are used only to compile statistical totals.
