Strike Over For GTE Co.

General Telephone employees have ratified a 30-month contract with the company bringing to an end a week-long strike at facilities in Western Washington, Oregon and Northern California.

The nearly 3,000 members of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers have been asked to call special telephone numbers to make arrangements for returning to their jobs.

Union officials said 2,251 members cast ballots in the election with 1,164 favoring acceptance of the contract and 1,078 voting no.

The contract, providing for an 8.8 percent pay increase retroactive to December 1, 1973, expires on June 1, 1976. Two other pay increases during the term of the contract provide for a 7 percent boost on December 1, 1974 and a 3.3 percent raise on December 1, 1975.

Public Hearing Slated By OBL

Age discrimination in employment has been the area of concern and of ad hoc committee which has been meeting for the past several months in cooperation with the Oregon Bureau of Labor. The committee, under the leadership of Sam Lissitz, chairman, has been working towards establishing guidelines on age discrimination to assist employers in complying with Oregon Revised Statute 659.024 which makes it unlawful to hire or dismiss on the basis of age.

Two public hearings have been planned to hear testimony from the public on the proposed guidelines. Locations and dates are March 20, in Room No. 36, State Office Building, Portland beginning at 10 a.m.; and March 29, in Harris Hall, Lane County Courthouse, Eugene, beginning at 10:30. Mr. Sam Lissitz will conduct the hearing. Copies of the proposed guidelines may be obtained from the Office of Labor Relations Department at the State Office Building, Portland. Persons who wish to present views, arguments or data at the hearings may do so either orally or in writing.
