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Ore. Accidents On Decrease

Oregon recorded 46,482 traffic accidents last year, injuring 34,198 people.

Chester W. Ott, Administrator of the Oregon Motor Vehicles Division, said Tuesday that although traffic deaths decreased nearly 14 percent last year the just-completed statistics on total accidents and injuries reveal only very slight decreases when compared with the previous year.

Accidents decreased about 2 1/2 percent and injuries were down by about 1 1/2 percent.
