4-H Schedules Summer Camp At Wilkerson

Older 4-H club members will have fun and excitement and get leadership experience by being counselors at a 4-H summer camp. Columbia County 4-H club members who wish to be counselors should submit their application to the County Extension Office in St. Helens by March 27.

Five young people will have the opportunity to attend a Camp Counselor Retreat at Camp Myrtlewood between Roseburg and Myrtle Point Friday, April 19 through Sunday, April 21. This will be a counselor learning and training retreat and those who attend will provide counselor leadership for their home county at a later date to train additional counselors for the summer camp.

The trained cadre of counselors who attend Camp Myrtlewood for Columbia, Tillamook and Washington Counties will train the additional counselors from those counties on May 17 and 18 at the Oregon 4-H Educational Center near Salem.

The Columbia County 4-H Camp is scheduled to be held at Camp Wilkerson August 5-8. It is important that all young people desiring to be counselors submit their application to the Extension Office in the Courthouse at St. Helens by March 27.

Three Teachers Leave District 47J

As of next year, the Vernonia School District will be minus a few respected and well-known faculty members. Retiring will be Don Kabler, who is the agriculture teacher, and Mrs. Mildred Matheson, home economics teacher. One other teacher has already left the school district, Mrs. Patti Taylor, who is going to have a baby.

Don Kabler has been teaching agriculture at Vernonia High School for eight years. Kabler has been noted as a first rate Ag. teacher and was named, while teaching at VHS, as Agriculture Teacher of the Year. This distinguished award earned him a trip to Europe. Kabler is also advisor of the FFA.

Mildred Matheson has been teaching home economics to both high school and grade school girls and boys at VHS for five years. Before coming to Vernonia she previously taught in the Pendleton School District. She teaches various classes, from Jr. High Home Economics to Bachelor Cooking.

Mrs. Patti Taylor who has already left the teaching staff, taught in the language arts department at Washington Grade School. She has been replaced by Mr. Jack Seely. Mrs. Taylor is the wife of Mr. Mike Taylor, who is the drafting teacher at VHS.

The school district and the students will miss these hard-working and dedicated teachers.

Girls Shop Classes Learn to Decoupage

The third and fourth period shop classes have been learning to decoupage pictures.

The pictures are placed either on regularly finished boards or on chip board. The edges are chipped, and the area around the picture is burnt with a torch. Some of the pictures are torn around the edge and burnt with a match, which blends the picture in with the burnt chip board.

The class has turned out many beautiful pictures of various subjects such as animals, quotations, people, countryside, and comic characters.

The cost depends on the wood used and the size of the picture, but it is usually a small amount.

Mr. Walters, the shop instructor, is teaching the girls how to decoupage because he said, "It is something the girls can do at home, and by themselves. They don't need a shop or shop facilities to do it."

The pictures are now on display in the main hall.

Driver Education Program Gets Gas

Gordon Crowston, Drivers Ed. instructor for eight years, said that he hopes the gas situation remains the same because the program does depend on the availability of gas.

Driver's training in many cases will make students insurance premium lower, but the amount varies with different insurance companies.

Mrs. Mathison, the Vernonia High School homemaking instructor, has been very busy with her advanced homemaking class.

Mrs. Mathison, who has four girls, Donna Willard, Linda Brunk, Joyce Clason, and Beth McLean, has now completed with them seven different international meals.

The course started out with a well-known food in the United States. The Mexican meal consisted of enchiladas, refried beans, gaspacho, guacamole, along with a centerpiece containing Mexican souvenirs.

Oriental meals were next on the agenda. The girls were given a pair of chop sticks before the course began and were told to practice with them so they could eat their meals with them. The meal was shrimp foo yung, fried rice, a salad consisting of mandarin orange slices, and Japanese cookies.

The first time the girls made their fried rice it didn't turn out quite right, so Mrs. Mathison had them make it again in their next meal with Teriyaki. The rice was prepared in what is called a Chinese Wok, and turned out "just right."

The last meal of the oriental unit was made at the table which is one of the Japanese customs. Sukiyaki, fried noodles, and steamed rice. Jasmin tea was the drink served with the meal.

The Italian unit began with antipastos, which is a relish plate, followed by chicken cacciatore and buttered noodles. Insalata Verde (a green salad) was served with an Italian dressing.

The girls last meal was in the presence of a dinner guest, Mrs. Nancy Eckland, who is a VHS library aide, and was invited to eat their Lasagne, garlic French bread, and a tossed green salad.

The advanced Homemaking Class is now baking breads.

The girls have made chocolate eclairs, Danish pastry, flaming crepe suzette, cherry flan made in special flan pans, and plan to be making Scandinavian Rosettes on the Monday after Spring vacation.
