

Missionary Will Speak

Miss Karen Brebner, mission-ary nurse to Burundi, Africa, with World Gospel Mission, will speak at Vernonia Evangelical Church Sunday, June 16 at 7 p.m. The Mission, an interdenominational sending organization with 300 missionaries, associate missionaries, and homeland staff, serves in 15 areas of the world. The international head-

quarters is in Marion, Indiana. Miss Brebner attended Westmont College, Santa Barbara, California, and took her nurse's training at Emmanuel Hospital School of Nursing, Portland, Oregon. She graduated also from Cascade College, formerly of Portland, with the B.S. degree in nursing. Before going to the field in 1961, she studied French and tropical medicines in Belgium.

During her first years in Burundi, Miss Brebner served at Murore Hospital assisting the resident doctor. After a normal furlough in the States, she returned to the field and was stationed at Kayero. Due to the shortage of medical personnel, she also assisted at the Murche Dispensary. Without a doctor. she and African assistants diagnosed illnesses and prescribed medication for hundreds of patients who came to the dispensaries each week. In a recent year, over 120,000 people were given treatment at the Kayero, Murehe and Murore dispensaries. In each of these, inpatient facilities are available for seriously ill patients, who are given around-the-clock care by a nurse or an assistant.

Bible classes are held for the African dispensers. A national chaplain speaks to the patients in daily evangelistic services. Many patients have no contact with the gospel of Christ except through WGM's medical ministries

In 1970, Miss Brebner again returned to Burundi and worked through the years of tribal warfare, a very difficult time, when thousands (a conservative estimate is 150,000) of the Burundi were ruthlessly slaughtered.
Miss Brebner has been attend-

ing Western Evangelical Seminary, Portland, Oregon, and doing part-time nursing in the city. She is planning to return to Burundi as soon as travel and support shares are in hand.
