### Witnesses

The Watchtower Bible and Tract Society has revealed plans for 85 district conventions of Jehovah's Witnesses in the United States and Canada in 1974.

James Milton, presiding minister of the Vernonia congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses, said there will be 74 assemblies for English-speaking delegates and eleven meetings in Spanish, French and Italian.

Milton said approximately 38 delegates will represent the Vernonia congregation at the convention scheduled for Portland, Oregon, July 11 through 14.

He added that 15,000 delegates are expected to attend the Portland convention set for the Civic Stadium.

"Hundreds of thousands of persons are looking forward with eager anticipation to the series of 'Divine Purpose' District Assemblies of Jehovah's Witnesses this summer," Milton said.

"The combined attendance is expected to reach nearly one-million persons this year. Young and old, family groups and even the infirm will be there," he said.

The highlight of the convention program will be the public discourse on the subject "Human Plans Failing as God's Purpose Succeeds."

A baptism service will also be featured. Last year, 55,775 were baptized in the United States as Jehovah's Witnesses. This represents 10 percent of the total U.S. membership in only one year.

## Missionary Will Speak

Miss Karen Brebner, missionary nurse to Burundi, Africa, with World Gospel Mission, will speak at Vernonia Evangelical Church Sunday, June 16 at 7 p.m.

The Mission, an interdenominational sending organization with 300 missionaries, associate missionaries, and homeland staff, serves in 15 areas of the world. The international headquarters is in Marion, Indiana.

Miss Brebner attended Westmont College, Santa Barbara, California, and took her nurse's training at Emmanuel Hospital School of Nursing, Portland, Oregon. She graduated also from Cascade College, formerly of Portland, with the B.S. degree in nursing. Before going to the field in 1961, she studied French and tropical medicines in Belgium.

During her first years in Burundi, Miss Brebner served at Murore Hospital assisting the resident doctor. After a normal furlough in the States, she returned to the field and was stationed at Kayero. Due to the shortage of medical personnel, she also assisted at the Kayero Dispensary. Without a doctor, she and African assistants diagnosed illnesses and prescribed medication for hundreds of patients who came to the dispensaries each week. In a recent year, over 120,000 people were given treatment at the Kayero, Murehe and Murore dispensaries. In each of these, inpatient facilities are available for seriously ill patients, who are given around-the-clock care by a nurse or an assistant.

Bible classes are held for the African dispensers. A national chaplain speaks to the patients in daily evangelistic services. Many patients have no contact with the gospel of Christ except through WGM's medical ministries.

In 1970, Miss Brebner again returned to Burundi and worked through the years of tribal warfare, a very difficult time, when thousands (a conservative estimate is 150,000) of the Burundi were ruthlessly slaughtered.

Miss Brebner has been attending Western Evangelical Seminary, Portland, Oregon, and doing part-time nursing in the city. She is planning to return to Burundi as soon as travel and support shares are in hand.

### New Pastor Slated For Vernonia SDA

A new Seventh-day Adventist Pastor is slated for Vernonia and St. Helens District. Taking Elder Letcher L. Huntington's place is Pastor Willard L. Santee, a graduate of Walla Walla College.

Santee has worked throughout Oregon and in Michigan, while taking graduate studies at Andrews Theological Seminary.

Santee has worked as a Singing Evangelist - Youth Leader - and Resident Pastor.

Pastor Santee and wife Joan are residing in St. Helens with their three sons, Kevin, Kelly, and Kenny.

### Board of Commissioners

(Memorandum Minutes)

The Columbia County Board of Commissioners met in regular session June 5 with Chairman Fred Foshaug presiding, Commissioners Minkoff and Ahlborn, and secretary Gloria Salvey (deputy clerk) present.

Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded the minutes of the meeting of May 29 be approved. Motion carried.

Miscellaneous claims were approved.

Robert Vagt, attorney, representing C. Edwin Roberts, met with the board to discuss purchase of mineral rights on property located near Rainier. Vagt was advised the purchase price which would be required, and that the board would proceed with the necessary advertising upon receipt of the purchase price.

Circuit Judge Don Kalberer met with the board to discuss revision of the commonly-known "rock festival ordinance" and reduction of the number of persons the ordinance would cover. Judge Kalberer was advised this had been referred to the District Attorney for revision some time ago, but that no action had been taken.

Judge Kalberer also advised his intent to appear at the Budget Hearing on June 19 to endeavor obtaining an additional juvenile counselor.

Upon recommendation of the Columbia County Vector Control District, Commissioner Ahlborn moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded that the board conduct by the Layman of the church, and he has had extensive background in church administration and evangelism. Elder Schneider is a dynamic speaker and promises a real spiritual feast to all who hear him.

The Sabbath School lesson is still on the Seventh Trumpets of Revelation.

Prayer meeting will be held Tuesday evening at 7:30 p.m. at the church. Our new pastor, Elder Santee will be with us for prayer meeting. His first sermon at the church will be Sabbath June 22nd.

Resolution No. 65-74 was signed, in the matter of requiring a permit for approach roads to county roads, and adopting a form to use therefor.

Order No. 66-74 was signed, denying the petition to vacate a portion of Archibald Road No. 30 located in Sections 19 and 30, and withdrawing same as a county road declaring it to be a road of public easement.

Order No. 67-74 was signed, vacating a portion of the county road known as Columbia Way, No. P-194, as petitioned.

At 1:30 p.m. a show cause hearing was held on solid waste complaint pertaining to property known as Account 15733-033, owned by Warren E. Wollitz. No one appeared in behalf of Wollitz. Commissioner Ahlborn moved and Commissioner Minkoff seconded the recommendations of the Administrator, Mr. Rahe, be followed, to-wit: Declaration of the existence of a solid waste nuisance on the property, with fifteen days allowed for the tenant to complete the cleanup operation. If cleanup is not completed within that time, the matter will be referred to the District Attorney for abatement of the nuisance. Motion carried.

Terry Rahe, Sanitarian, then presented each commissioner with a copy of the Metropolitan Service District Solid Waste Management Action Plan.

Rahe presented his recommendations with regard to a proposed landfill application submitted by Shoreline Rock Products, for disposal of clarifier waste, wood scraps and other wood waste from the Boise Cascade mill. After lengthy discussion, Commissioner Ahlborn moved and Commissioner Minkoff seconded the application for permit be denied, based upon the recommendations of the Solid Waste Advisory Committee (SWAC), and correspondence received from the Department of Environmental Quality. Motion carried.

Rahe then presented copies of correspondence received from Santosh Disposal, Inc. relating to diking requirements for the Santosh site, together with a draft of a letter to Phil Holzshemer regarding agreements to be made between the county, DEQ, and Santosh, with regard to constructing of necessary dikes with regard to franchising of the operation. After consideration of the recommendations and the alternatives, Commissioner Ahlborn moved and Commissioner Minkoff seconded a letter of intent, as drafted, be submitted to Santosh Disposal, Inc., indicating the county's willingness to grant a 10-year franchise providing a satisfactory agreement can be made for constructing of dikes, and all requirements of the Solid Waste Ordinance are met. Motion carried.

A show cause hearing was set for July 10, 1974, at 1:30 p.m. in Room 308, Courthouse, on complaint on Tax Lot 3552-14, owned by Milton G. Russell, Route 1, Box 414, St. Helens.

Ron Reeves presented the board, and recommended approval, of Surface Mining Permit for Deane S. Chappell & Son Rock and Construction Co. Accompanying the permit was assignment of savings account or deposit for the required bonding. The permit was approved for Chappell.

An Agreement was signed between the county and Melvin C. Harper, Builder, for installation of two doors, and soundproofing of six doors, in the jail, per grant for completion of the maximum security section of the jail.

John DeFrance met with the Board to advise there were still some funds available in the grant for completion of the maximum security section, and requested the Board's authorization to prepare an addendum to the agreement with Melvin C. Harper, Builder, to replace the existing metal light fixtures in the jail. Approval was granted for this addition.

Robert Lucas, district attorney, met with the board to again discuss funding of a portion of the salary for a law intern to work for a period of two months for the county. The board agreed it would provide the additional \$700 required for the two-month

### period.

Terry Rahe, administrator of the Solid Waste Ordinance, presented further recommendations with regard to the solid waste nuisance on the Ralph Hildula property, Account 3384-009. Upon Mr. Rahe's recommendation, Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded the case be referred to the District Attorney's office with request for writ of abatement, under the Ordinance. Motion carried.

Rahe then reported on the status of the Bicycle-Pedestrian Advisory Task Force, and requested authorization to expend monies from the Footpath and Bicycle Trail Fund for a title search with regard to Rutherford Road, P-98, to determine if the county still owned all of the right of way. Authorization was granted for this expenditure.

Rahe discussed with the board a proposed resolution agreeing to and approving in concept the implementation of the MSD Solid Waste Management Plan in Columbia County. It was agreed the Resolution as proposed would be prepared for signature.

Rahe also discussed a proposed budget for a DEQ grant for a solid waste technician for development of the Columbia County solid waste plan as presented by the MSD. It was agreed this would be taken into consideration at the time the 1974-75 budget is adopted for the county.

An Order was signed, No. 68-74, refunding building permit fee of \$126.90 to Warner Brothers for Thomas Broadbent, because of voiding of permit.

Sitting as the DOG CONTROL BOARD, the following actions were taken: Indemnity Claim for \$1,080 for 27 sheep killed by dogs, was approved for Magruder Farms, Inc.; Indemnity Claim for \$700 for 14 sheep killed, was denied, submitted by Dick Magruder, for Magruder Farms, Inc. Denial was based upon improper filing of claim; Indemnity Claim for \$52 for 13 laying hens was approved for Frances Heinen; Indemnity Claim for \$30 for 1 sheep was approved for Mrs. Arnold Sattler.

The offer of \$1,000 received from Vivian Schimmel to purchase Lot 5, Block 103, St. Helens, was denied as an insufficient amount.

The offer of \$1,050 received from Warner Brothers Custom Builders to purchase Lot 5, Block 103, St. Helens, was also denied as an insufficient amount.

Commissioner Minkoff moved and Commissioner Ahlborn seconded to approve the following purchase orders: 3263, Paul Zimmerman Road Construction, rock for Mustola Road flood repair, \$842.00; 3264, Unistrut Northwest Service Center, mile post material, \$1,375.00; 3267, St. Helens Paving, cold mix, 3,710.64; 3268, Olson and Johnson, dieseline, gasoline and kerosene, \$1,418.10. Motion carried.

The Addendum to Agreement was signed with Melvin C. Harper, Builder, for replacement of light fixtures in the jail.

Request for Cancellation of Taxes, in the sum of \$48.24, and Order Reimbursing Taxes in the Sum of \$46.79 were approved for Ronald L. and Violet D. Martin, as a result in error in segregation of accounts.

Requests for cancellation of Taxes, in the sum of \$653.26, in favor of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latterday Saints was approved, as a result of Senate Bill 659, exempting the property from taxation for the 1972-73 tax year.
